Playground marching toward completion

Progress is being made toward completion of the new playground in Kingston Park.

Mayor of Kingborough, Cr Dean Winter expects the new playground to open in autumn.

'We will have the playground ready to go in March," Mayor Winter stated "Things are progressing well with contractors making good progress towards completion.

'The aim is to have the playground open to the public in early March.

"I am a little disappointed we could not get it finished in time for the summer school holidays, but we had a few COVID-related setbacks in the second half of last year, especially with getting various components into the state.

"The playground is the next component of our plan to transform Kingston from a tired old highway town to a thriving, exciting place to be.

'Kingston has to be a place people want to come to," explained Mayor Winter "A place for them to sit, wander, eat and drink.

"It can't just be a place you drive to, buy something and get back in the ca "The playground, the new townhouse development on the site community hub and hopefully a major employer on the site down the track

will all contribute to making Kingborough a great place to live." A transformation of the Channel Highway through the heart of Kingston's

main business and shopping hub is also set to commence this year. "By the end of this year, we want to have commenced the reconstruction

on the Channel Highway at Kingston," said Mayor Winter.

"It's not a highway anymore.

"It has to be a main street, with wide footpaths and outdoor dining.

"Street trees will be abundant.

"That's what our transform Kingston survey results told us and that's what we want to deliver.' Another attractive element of the Kingston Park playground is

Kingborough Council have declared the area as a smoke-free zone. Smoking of tobacco will not be allowed within the entire boundary of Stage

1, which covers the playground and a significant amount of open space around the play equipment. This will reduce the potential for involuntary exposure to environmental smoke for children and families wanting to utilise the area and contribute to

the overall health of the community. Along with providing signage around the playground to encourage compliance, it is anticipated that further smoke free areas will be introduced

as the Kingston Park development expands "Right at the start of the planning for this, former Mayor Graham Bury

initiated a plan for the site to be smoke-free," stated Mayor Winter.

"On Monday night, council finalised that vision.

"We want Kingston Park to a healthy, family-friendly place to play and visit."

Funding boost prompts Stage 2 push

Kingborough Council will be able to push ahead with Stage 2 of the Kingston Park public open space two years earlier than anticipated due to a Federal Government funding boost.

The first stage of the development is the soon to be completed playground area, with Stage 2 to include the landscaping of the low-lying area to the north of the playground for more passive recreational use.

The anticipated delay to the commencement of works on Stage 2 of the public open space was due to financial constraints, with Kingborough

Councillors endorsed making the funding available for the Kingston Park project at the most recent council meeting on Monday, January 18.

"The Australian Government has initiated a funding pool which provides infrastructure funding based on each Local Government Area's population and size," Mayor of Kingborough, Cr Dean Winter explained

"For Kingborough, this meant it has been allocated around \$1.4 million. "Kingborough Council unanimously endorsed using this funding to bring forward the second stage of its Kingston Park public open space project by

Mayor Winter said council would now ask the Australian Government for permission to use the funding to develop the parkland on the Huon Highway side of the old Kingston High School site.

Cybersafety during backto-school shopping

Kingborough parents are being urged to be vigilant while shopping online for school essentials this month, with back-to-school shopping opening up opportunities for cybercriminals to strike.

Assistant Minister for Defence, the Honourbale Andrew Hastie MP said the relentless efforts to steal money and data from Australians by cybercriminals will see them target busy families preparing for the 2021 school year.

"While parents are shopping online for back-to-school supplies, cybercriminals are shopping around for their next victim," Assistant Minister Hastie said.

"The internet has revolutionised shopping, and cybercriminals continue to revolutionise their craft.

"Parents can reduce the risk of becoming victims of cybercrime by taking steps such as only purchasing items from trusted sellers, being aware of fake retailers, and always using secure payment methods."

The Australian Cyber Security Centre (ACSC) leads the Australian Government's operational efforts to boost the nation's cyber resilience and make Australia the most secure place to connect online.

Head of the Australian Cyber Security Centre, Ms Abigail Bradshaw CSC, encouraged Australians to access the ACSC's updated guidance, published as part of the ongoing cyber security campaign.

"Australians must be alert to opportunistic cybercriminals who are seeking to exploit the expected surge in Australians purchasing products online for school," Ms Bradshaw said.

"Our advice is designed to be quick to read and simple to apply and this updated guidance is designed to help Australians avoid the risks associated with shopping online."

Cybercrime can be reported through ReportCyber which is managed by the ACSC on behalf of law enforcement agencies, providing a single online portal for individuals and businesses to report cyber incidents.

Serious collision Channel Highway

Police and emergency services attended a head on crash on the Channel Highway, Kingston near the North West Bay Golf Club on Monday, January 18.

Motorists were asked to avoid the area from 12:30pm until the road was cleared at 4:20pm, as the road was blocked in both directions.

Police reported serious injuries were sustained by those involved and Acting Inspector Nikala Parsons gave an update on site at 2pm on Monday, January 18. Acting Inspector Parsons said both vehicles contained single occupants.

A 68 year old male, the driver of a white Volkswagen travelling south, was taken to the Royal Hobart Hospital in a critical condition.

An 80 year old male, the driver of a Toyota Prado trav-

elling north, sustained serious injuries and was also transported to the Royal Hobart Hospital.

Acting Inspector Parsons said that preliminary investigations indicated one of the vehicles had travelled to the incorrect side of the road and there was no excessive speed involved.

"This section of the Channel Highway is mostly a particularly safe section, it is a straight section of road," Acting Inspector Parsons said.

"There have historically been some accidents on the Channel Highway but there are a number of other contributing factors in terms of those crashes. "Things like inattention and turning out to a busy road."

Any witnesses of the incident are asked to contact Tasmania Police.

Waiting for home care

Elderly Tasmanians are waiting almost three years to receive high level home care packages they have had approved, according to Member for Franklin and Shadow Minister for Ageing and Seniors, the Honourable Julie Collins MP.

Ms Franklin said on January 20 that new figures reveal the full extent of waiting lists and indicated the aged care system was "broken"

Senate Estimates Community Affairs Committee noted 1293 people in southern Tasmania were on the waiting list. "Here in Tasmania, there are currently 2,663 older

Tasmanians still waiting for care that has already been approved," Ms Collins said.

"In southern Tasmania, there are currently 14 older Tasmanians waiting for Level 1 home care packages, 435 people waiting for Level 2 packages, 663 waiting for Level 3 packages and 181 waiting for Level 4 packages.

"Over the three years leading up to mid-2020, more than 30,000 older Australians died waiting for home care that had been approved.

"The Aged Care Royal Commission's interim report

detailing the crisis in aged care was titled 'Neglect'," noted Ms Collins.

"It called for urgent action more than a year ago."

The Kinaborough Chronicle invited Senator for Tasmania, the Honourable Eric Abetz to provide a response regarding the situation in southern Tasmania. Senator Abetz stated the figures reflected an increase in demand for aged care in the home.

Senator Abetz said the Federal Government has allocated "record amounts" of funding to home care packages, including a budget increase to \$25 million.

Senator Abetz said the number of packages have "more than tripled" across Australia and will have risen to 185,597 by June 2021.

"The recent MYEFO announced just prior to Christmas, another \$1 billion was allocated releasing an additional 10,000 home care packages," said Senator Abetz.

'The demand for aged care in the family home has grown." "We have doubled the budget and tripled the number of home care packages but recognise more needs to be done." Minister for Senior Australians and Aged Care Services

and Senator for Tasmania, the Honourable Richard Colbeck also responded on January 21, stating the government had invested \$5.5 billion for 83,105 additional home care packages since the 2018-19 budget and will consider further recommendations from the Royal Commission when it hands down its final report in February.

"As a result of our strong investment, a total of 195,597 packages will be issued by June 30, 2021 and ongoing," Minister Colbeck said.

"The National Prioritisation System has been designed to allocate packages evenly, to avoid unnecessary discrepancies between states.

"In less than two years, the number of people waiting with a Level 4 approval has dropped 75 percent.

"The government's investment has resulted in an additional 1200 people having access to packages per

"Additionally, 99 percent of senior Australians waiting for a package at their assessed level have been offered support from the government, including an interim package of support or Commonwealth Home Support Program.

Hot spots cooling

Kingborough residents hoping to travel interstate in the near future were advised of COVID travel restriction updates by Premier of Tasmania, the Honourable Peter Gutwein MP on Monday, January 18.

"With the situation in Queensland improving, the Greater Brisbane area will be classified as medium risk effective immediately, in line with public health advice," stated Premier Gutwein.

"We will continue to monitor the situation in Queensland closely and subject to the situation in Brisbane continuing to improve, I am hopeful that by the end of the week, Greater Brisbane could return to being classified as low risk, meaning a return to unrestricted

This means that travellers from the Greater Brisbane area are allowed to come to Tasmania but will still be required to quarantine either at a suitable residence, or in State Government accommodation, at their own

Premier Gutwein described the government's approach as "cautious and prudent" which is a reflection on the high transmission rate of the UK strain of the virus.

"The Greater Sydney area and Wollongong LGA will remain classified as medium risk for the time being, given the number of locally acquired cases seen yesterday in particular and the need to be confident that there aren't any further undetected cases circulating in the community," continued Premier Gutwein.

Travel restrictions have been lifted from Victorian hotspots, meaning travellers from that state are now classified as low-risk and can enter Tasmania without

A Public Health Direction that face masks be worn on commercial flights in Tasmanian airspace, both from interstate and within the state, and at airports is now in force.

This includes indoors at check-in, bag drop and in retail outlets, as well as outdoor areas where other people are present such as when waiting for transport.

The changes apply to everyone leaving their vehicle at any airport across the state, including those dropping off or picking up loved ones.

Director of Public Health, Dr Mark Veitch said the mask mandate aims to reduce the risk of COVID-19 exposure for visitors to airports as well as travellers.

Heightened measures are also being put implemented for travel on the Spirit of Tasmania.

"We will also be putting in place a Direction to support TT Line's current policy requiring mask wearing on the Spirit of Tasmania and for it to apply to the seaport," Premier Gutwein explained.

"We continue to thank Tasmanians for doing the right thing and helping our state keep on top of COVID this summer.

"Remember to keep washing your hands regularly, cover your coughs and sneezes, stay home if you're unwell and keep those testing rates up, even if you have the mildest symptoms, please get a test."

The Premier also advised on January 20 that preparations are continuing for a mass vaccination emergency coordination centre "one of the biggest health logistical exercises in recent history", with the national COVID-19 vaccination program due to commence in February.

A day to celebrate

Two convicts destined for the hangman's noose successfully suing a ship's captain is part of our rich egalitarian history which arrived in Australia in 1788 and helped forge our national

These felons had their death penalties commuted to transportation on the First Fleet arriving on January

This husband-and-wife team had been given a parcel of items valued at £15, about \$3000 today.

The parcel was put on board but did not emerge from the ship on arrival at Botany Bay.

The convicts sued the more powerful ship's captain (Sinclair) and had judgement entered in their favour for £15. The principle of equality before the law was there

and then established in Australia's very first civil case.

Another civilising feature brought with the First Fleet was the injunction from Australia's first king, King George III. In his letters patent, he required Governor Phillip and all those under him, in other words, everyone: "... to open an intercourse with the natives and to conciliate their affections, enjoining all our subjects to live in amity and kindness with them".

Those exceptionally humanitarian instructions were dated April 25, 1787.

Wildly radical for that era.

The above are just two examples of the exceedingly beneficial foundational values, which by the way should be taught in our schools, that came to Australia with the First Fleet on January 26, 1788, the day we've appropriately chosen to celebrate our nation's

Consultation opens on wellbeing of children

Children, young people, parents, carers, service providers and other members of Kingborough can have their say in a community-wide consultation to inform Tasmania's first, long-term, Child and Youth Wellbeing Strategy.

The Strategy will cover all children and young people from 0 to 25 years old, with a specific focus on the first 1000 days.

Participants can share their contributions, hopes and dreams for children and voung people in Tasmania through drawings, paintings, or through creative writing of stories and poems.

Participants can also make a formal written submission to a discussion paper, send a postcard to the Premier or complete a survey on their ideas to improve wellbeing. Paper-based materials are being distributed to compli-

ment website material. Tasmania's Commissioner of Children and Young People, Leanne McLean welcomed the launch of the community-wide consultation on January 19.

"Investing in the wellbeing of children and young people not only upholds their rights under the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child but also provides the foundation for prosperity for all Tasmanians, irrespective of age," Ms McLean said.

"Children and young people are experts in their own lives and provide a unique perspective on their needs and the ways to overcome barriers to achieving the very best wellbeing outcomes for them, now and into the future.

"I welcome the genuine desire to consult with children and young people around Tasmania to inform the development of the strategy.

"I strongly encourage all children and young people in Tasmania up to the age of 25, as well as their parents, carers, service providers and other members of the community, to have their say."

Ms McLean said face-to-face consultations are also being run statewide by the Youth Network of Tasmania, the Mental Health Council of Tasmania and Playgroup Tasmania.

"I have also had the great pleasure and privilege of conducting consultations with children, young people and their families and will be reporting on the outcomes of those consultations to assist and inform the development of the government's strategy," Ms McLean said

In March 2020, the Tasmanian Government committed to delivering the state's first Child and Youth Wellbeing Strategy following the release of the Commissioner McLean's report which recommended the development of a long-term whole-of-government strategy for improving the wellbeing.

Premier of Tasmania, the Honourable Peter Gutwein MP said the Child and Youth Wellbeing Strategy will focus on the first 1000 days of a child's life.

"We know this time provides a critical foundation for the rest of a young person's life," Premier Gutwein said.

"Students who have greater wellbeing are more likely to have better educational outcomes, and a better quality of life, with the Strategy providing the blueprint for Tasmanian children to thrive.

"The consultation will ensure children, young people, their caregivers, service providers and policy makers can make their voices heard, with multiple ways for people to have their say and input ideas through paperbased, digital and face-to-face channels.

"The Strategy will be delivered in the first half of 2021 and will be considered in the 2021-22 Tasmanian Budget."

The consultation process will run until March 19.





Council will then be able to make use of the funds allocated through the Commonwealth Government's COVID-19 Local Roads and Community Infrastructure program, alongside the budgeted \$1.2 million, to bring the program forward and include a variety of highly desirable, but otherwise unaffordable, amenities for the community, upgrading the overall plans for the space.

This will allow for a small toilet block, a maintenance and storage shed for council use, additional public space such as a picnic lawn, terraced seating to the amphitheatre area and additional barbecue facilities.

"This will be a place for people to come, socialise, sit, relax or exercise," stated Mayor Winter.

"It is naturally a beautiful spot anyway, with the creek

and grassland.

"The funding will allow us to build new toilets, footpaths, lighting and gardens.

"Importantly, it will include an amphitheatre so that we can finally start hosting outdoor events, like Christmas

Council hopes to start the project in the second half of the year as the "use it or lose it" funding is only available for projects which will be completed by the end of December, 2021.

The development of the Stage 2 public open space is expected to complement other areas of the Kingston Park development such as the Kingborough Community Hub, playground, café, parking and connecting walkways for easy pedestrian access through to the Kingston CBD.



Lifejacket servicing

Tasmania has the highest rate of private boat ownership in Australia, which is hardly surprising considering the amazing coastline and inland waterways.

Generally the Tasmanian boating community takes marine safety very seriously.

When it comes to complying with the regulations to wear inflatable and non-inflatable lifejackets, 94 percent of Tasmanian boaties do the right thing, according to Maritime And Safety Tasmania (MAST).

However, when it comes to regularly servicing inflatable lifejackets boaties fail dismally.

Every inflatable lifejacket has a requirement to be maintained and serviced regularly.

MAST General Manager, Recreational Boating Safety and Facilities, Peter Hopkins said the greatest danger facing recreational boat owners is the lack of familiarity with their safety equipment, especially inflatable lifejackets.

"There are several important points that every boat owner needs to be aware of," Mr Hopkins said.

"Firstly, make sure that you are familiar with the type of inflatable lifejacket you own.

"Is it self-inflating or manually activated?

"This is critical information in an emergency situation and it's vital that you instruct your passengers and crew on how to use their lifejackets before you head out onto the water.

"When you purchase inflatable lifejackets check the manufacturer's servicing instructions and then make

sure you follow their schedule.

"Correctly maintaining your inflatable lifejacket to the manufacturer's recommendations is a legal requirement.

"When you buy the lifejacket you also purchase the ongoing responsibility to maintain it," Mr Hopkins explained.

MAST encourages boat owners to self-check their inflatable lifejackets rather than self-service.

"It's easy to perform a self-check of your inflatable lifejackets," Mr Hopkins said.

"Firstly do a visual inspection and make sure there is no

"Firstly, do a visual inspection and make sure there is no visible damage to the straps and fabric of the lifejacket.

"Then check that the gas cylinder is not corroded and that it is firmly screwed into place.

"A common cause of an inflatable lifejacket failure is a

loose gas cylinder.

"Servicing your lifejacket is a different matter."

"Servicing your lifejacket is a different matter.

"People can't service their own lifejackets as they do not have the required equipment or expertise," said Mr Hopkins.

MAST recommends boat owners leave servicing of lifejackets to the experts and provides a list of accredited service centres on their website at: www.mast.tas.gov.au/recreational/boating/life-jackets/

Chris Morris from accredited service centre, Lifejacket Servicing Tasmania in Blackmans Bay, services a wide range of inflatable lifejackets both for recreational and professional users.

"Following the manufacturer's requirements for servicing and doing regular self-checks will ensure your inflatable lifejacket will work when it needs to" Mr Morris said.

"Not many people wear their inflatable lifejackets correctly.

"Make sure that it is fitted and fastened properly and where possible use a crotch strap as this will dramatically improve the performance of the jacket when inflated.

"A perfect way to ensure that you are familiar with your inflatable lifejacket is, prior to a service, blow it up and jump into the water.

"Check for comfort and see how it floats you," recommended Mr Morris.

"Now is a great time to check your lifejackets as new legislation came into effect from January 1, 2021.

"This new standard ensures greater buoyancy for both inflatable and non-inflatable lifejackets.

"My advice to all boat owners is to check all of your lifejackets right now and make sure they meet Australian Standard 4758.1.

"If they don't they will need to be replaced.

"Get your compliant lifejackets serviced when required and don't forget you may have to provide a proof of service to authorities when requested, such as a compliance certificate, a notation on the jacket itself, a service tag, or a receipt," concluded Mr Morris.

Be boat wise, there are no second chances

Tasmania has a coastline greater than the combined coastlines of NSW and Victoria and we have more registered boats per head of population than any other state or territory in the country.

Boating has come a long way in 22 years in Tasmania, with one in 17 Tasmanians now owning a registered boat and one in eight possessing a recreational boat licence. From June 1998 to June 2020, the state has seen the recreational fleet grow by 134.5 per cent.

This does not count powered boats under 4hp, kayaks and canoes which frequent our rivers, lakes and offshore, where Marine and Safety Tasmania (MAST) estimate one in five or more Tasmanians are involved in boating.

Within those statistics there lies a great deal of responsibility for those who go boating, for boat owners, the skipper on the day and indeed the crew aboard.

Since January 2001, Tasmania has had legislation for the compulsory wearing of life jackets in boats six metres and under.

This has seen the fatality rate drop from an average of 6.34 per annum from 1978 to December 2000 to 2.48 per annum since January 2001.

Considering the growth of the Tasmanian recreational fleet, this is a good result, but one fatality is one too many. Whilst a decline in the overall rate is encouraging, it is not only the compulsory wearing of life jackets that has been attributable to the decrease in the fatality rate. MAST has been pursuing several other educational programs over this period, including positive buoyancy and flare and safety nights around the state.

It is concerning though that MAST has seen an increase in infringement notices issued to people not carrying the required safety equipment on board for the area in which they go boating. In 2020, 45 per cent of infringement notices issued by police were for the non-carriage of correct safety gear.

This is a 30 per cent increase since 2014. In December 2020, MAST posted safety stickers to all registered boat owners with their renewals to ensure the boating public knew what the required gear on board was.

The MAST summer safety campaign is also highlighting this issue, so MAST is hopeful that the alarming percentage of infringements will decline in coming months.

A legislative change that affects all those on the water was the final change over to the Australian Standard 4758.

This standard was developed back in 2008 and it was introduced into legislation in 2010.

MAST has given the boating public 10 years to swap over to this standard.

The old Type 1, 2 and 3 PFDs are now obsolete and all life jackets in use in Tasmanian waters should now be branded with the AS4758 standard.

Life jackets must be worn in boats under six metres and, as 92 per cent of Tasmania's registered boats are trailerable, the vast majority are under that length.

They must also be worn in kayaks, canoes and any other light weight craft capable of being navigated.

If your choice of life jacket is an inflatable, then it must be serviced to the manufacturer's recommendations. Every manufacturer of inflatable life jackets has different servicing requirements, all of which meet

Australians standards.

Some call for servicing every two years, some say

they can be self-serviced annually, but need a full manufacturer's service every three years.

MAST recommends fitting a crutch strap, which is not required under Australian standards, to make these jackets even safer.

MAST wants Tasmanian skippers to be responsible, to get their inflatable life jackets serviced and self-check every trip.

Every time you go on your boat, it only takes a minute to check your inflatable life jacket, to check that the cylinder is properly fitted and ready for use.

When you put it on make sure it is zipped up.

Check the weather, not just for your departure time, but in the hours when you might be returning to the ramp or mooring.

When you get on board and are underway, keep an eye out for the weather as it changes around you, and tell someone where you are going.

Alcohol and boating can be a lethal mix.

Be a responsible skipper and stay under .05, it is in everybody's interest to be responsible on board.

Make sure your safety gear is always accessible. When you go boating, MAST wants you and your crew to come home safely.
