

Unstoppable Lollipop Liz

Elisabeth Hoare is celebrating 35 years as a crossing guard this week and has received a bundle of accolades, in the form of delightful cards with messages of thanks, from young admirers at Illawarra Primary School.

Affectionately known as Lollipop Liz by the children, parents and grandparents she safely marshals across streets, the septuagenarian is busier than ever.

The Kingborough Chronicle was invited to visit Liz on duty, at her double-crossing post outside Illawarra Primary School, on the afternoon of Wednesday, June 9. With stop sign in hand, Liz was cheerily directing the pedestrians, whilst

braving the chilly wet weather, dressed head-to-toe in bright orange. Smiles and friendly greetings were exchanged with locals as they passed

by with their school bags, prams and umbrellas. Liz noted the view wasn't a good as usual, given the inclement weather.

"This is one of the most scenic places to work," noted Liz. "I love the view and Sherbud Park is an ideal place for parents to park and

"Traffic is generally good and parents and kids are a joy to work with.

"Instead of retiring, I am now busier than ever having inherited a double crossing and a lot more children.

"I am flat out and don't need to go to the gym."

Liz remarked she's spent half her life working as a School Crossing Patrol

"For 28 years I was the crossing guard on the Midlands Highway, Brighton, dodging b-doubles before and after the Brighton bypass," noted Liz.

"Then I did a sea change and have done seven years for Illawarra Primary School since May 2014.

"I know all the children I cross, their names, names of siblings, parents, grandparents and their dogs.

"Some of the children choose to do my job for Educational Support

"They presented me with the cards they made, I was honoured."

Liz has worked long enough to see school children become parents of their own. "Some of the children I have crossed here are in high school, college or working now," remarked Liz.

"I even run into children I used to cross at Brighton who now are mothers and have children of their own.

"Funnily enough, I even discovered I went to school with one of your famous residents, Edna Pennicott."

Liz commented on some challenges associated with the job.

"We work in all weather conditions," noted Liz.

"Wind is tricky, trying to keep flags in poles. "The busiest day I have ever experienced was when a school bus broke

down on my crossing afternoon shift. "I became the sole person to organise traffic to and from school, traffic out of

Illawarra Road and, at the same time, cross the children safely over two roads. The unstoppable, Lollipop Liz, is not showing signs of stopping any time soon.

"I had to take three months off in 2020 because of COVID-19, as I was just in the vulnerable age," recalled Liz.

"I was glad to get back to work.

"I only work four days a week now as I have Thursdays off to play pennant bowls.

Medicare changes debate

Kingborough residents with upcoming orthopaedic, cardiac or general surgery procedures may find their Medicare benefits affected by the imminent changes recently announced by the Federal Government.

More than 900 Medicare Benefits Schedule (MBS) item rebates for private surgery are set to change on July 1 as part of the MBS Review of all 5,700 Medicare rebates.

The latest changes will affect rebates for general surgery, heart surgery and orthopaedic surgery, including those for hips, shoulders, hands.

In an article published via the Australian Medical Association (AMA) website on June 6, AMA President, Dr Omar Khorshid expressed his concerns over the recent changes and their impact on the medical sector.

"The AMA is concerned that the private healthcare sector, including health

funds, hospitals, doctors and patients, will not be ready for the July 1 changes due to poor implementation by the government," said Dr Khorshid.

"Less than one month out from the implementation of these changes and we still do not have all the information we need to assess and change over our schedules and payment processes to reflect the changes.

"We had enough problems in November 2018 when the first tranche of MBS Review changes resulted in private health insurers, through no fault of their own, not having their schedules updated in time.

"That meant that no-gap arrangements were not possible or were significantly delayed leading to uncertainty for doctors, and patients, alike.

Foster carers needed

A recent adoption day held in Kingston highlighted the need for foster carers and loving homes for the abundance of animals, particularly cats and kittens, which have pushed rescue organisations to capacity this year.

The Tasmanian Animal Rescue and Sanctuary (TARS) and Tasmanian Animal Rescue, Rehabilitation and Education Services (TARRES) have been assisting each other this season and Ten Lives Cat Centre recently issued an SOS for foster carers in southern Tasmania due to the large numbers of cats and kittens.

TARS was opened in September 2020 with the goal of reducing animal abandonment through improved access to resources, vet care and education for pet owners.

"So far, we have taken in and rehomed many animals including cats, dogs, chickens, ducks, horses, goats, sheep, rabbits, guinea pigs and mice," said Jenna, Director of TARS.

"We also advocate for better dog training and handling to reduce dog surrender rates and have guided many pet owners on how to manage their dog's behaviour before considering rehoming.

"This past weekend we hosted an adoption day and found two of our cats wonderful homes as well as accepting many donations from donors."

TARS are hoping to increase public awareness of the benefits of adopting over shopping for pets or to consider fostering homeless animals in need.

They would also love to grow their team of volunteers

TARRES has been operating state wide since 2017 and primarily deal with wildlife, although they have also been inundated with felines this season.

"Cats are one of the biggest causes of wildlife being injured, killed or suffering disease, so cat management is also a very high priority for us," said Nat, Director of TARRES.

"We have been filled beyond capacity with cats and kittens this year and thankfully TARS have come to the rescue by assisting us with fostering, adoptions and supplies. "We can achieve so much more by working along with

other rescues." TARRES have been trapping stray and feral cats with

the aim of reducing harm to wildlife. Having the cats desexed, microchipped, rehabilitated and socialised, before being adopted out to homes where they will be contained and not allowed to roam is part of breaking the cycle of feral cats.

As a fully not for profit organisation run completely by volunteers, TARRES rely on the generous donations of the public to keep operating. They are currently in desperate need of a variety of cat

and kitten supplies as well as foster carers and, of course, loving homes for their animals. More information about TARS is available at their web-

Increased eligibility for COVID-19 vaccine

More Kingborough residents will be eligible for free COVID-19 vaccinations under new guidelines released on June 4.

From Monday, June 7, the vaccine program roll out will change to include people aged 40 to 49 years; all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people aged 16 years and older; NDIS participants and their carers who are aged 16 years and older; and temporary visa holders aged under 50 years who are in Australia and have been approved for return to Australia through the travel exemption process.

Premier of Tasmania, Peter Gutwein MP also encouraged aged care residents and staff to get vaccinated.

"While here in Tasmania, we have stepped in to help vaccinate our aged care residents and staff, there is still more work to do and I once again encourage all aged care workers to get the vaccination to protect themselves and those they care for," Premier Gutwein stated.

"As we have consistently seen across the world, aged care homes are especially vulnerable to the serious impacts of COVID-19 and we must do all we can to ensure as many people, both staff and patients, are vaccinated as quickly as possible."

Premier Gutwein also thanked those Tasmanians who

have already been part of the program.

"Our vaccination program has been very successful so far, and Tasmania's take up leads the nation, with around 120,000 Tasmanians, or over 27 per cent of Tasmanians aged 16 years and over, having received their first dose of COVID-19 vaccine," commented Premier Gutwein.

"We thank Tasmanians for doing the right thing and encourage everyone to continue getting vaccinated, when it's your turn, and keep practicing COVID-safe behaviours.

"And finally as a reminder as we head into the winter months, please continue to wash your hands, cover your coughs and sneezes, if you're unwell stay at home and don't go to work and if you display even the mildest symptoms, please, get a test."

The Tasmania Parks and Wildlife Service (PWS) is inviting the Kingborough community to provide feedback on the Draft Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for a proposed development within the Ida Bay State Reserve.

The proponent, Darklab, is proposing to adapt historic elements contained within the Ida Bay State Reserve to include the installation of an international standard artwork called Transformer.

The proposal also includes the building of a visitor welcome centre, creation of a carpark and installation of a walking track to link the artwork, visitor centre and

The proponent aims to ensure that this development will not impede the potential for recommencement of a tourist railway on the site and has drafted a

Conservation Management Plan.

This plan provides guidance and direction to the proposed works within the historic heritage precinct at Ida Bay.

Rebates uncertain amidst Medicare review

"Patients were left out of pocket, spinal surgeries were delayed, and doctors couldn't provide patients with informed financial consent about potential gap fees," explained Dr Khorshid.

Local Liberal Senator Eric Abetz said that the Federal Government and the AMA have been working together since June 30 last year towards modernisation of the MBS, aligning it with clinical practice and improving patient outcomes.

"The government has been progressively working through the reports and have so far accepted 605 recommendations," said Senator Abetz.

"The taskforce is clinician-led, independent of government and comprised of eminent Australian clinicians and consumers.'

Senator Abetz also stated that details of the changes have been available since early this year.

"There has been ongoing and extensive engagement with the relevant peak bodies such as the Australian Medical Association, Australian Private Hospital Association and Private Healthcare Australia about the details of the July 1 changes," Senator Abetz said.

"Advance notice of the existing items and the proposed MBS rebates and item descriptors were provided to stakeholders, including insurers, and have been available on the Department's website since early 2021.

"All changes work to align rebates to modern clinical practice, remove obsolete items and ensure that patients receive the best medical outcomes possible."

Tasmanian Labour Senator Carol Brown has condemned the actions of the Federal Government and said the changes to Medicare are being "rammed through".

"Doctors have slammed the proposals, with the AMA saving the volume of changes in such a short timeframe is an act of "wilful incompetence",' declared Senator Brown.

Senator Abetz disagreed and dismissed the statement as inflammatory.

"Labor's Senator Brown's comments were both premature and ill-informed seeking to cause concern rather than being constructive," remarked Senator Abetz.

As well as the timing of the upcoming changes, Dr Khorshid also expressed concern over the scope of the new changes, which far exceed the previous review.

"Those changes involved replacing 70 spinal surgery items with 60 new items," Dr Khorshid remarked.

"The July 1 changes involve expected changes to 594 orthopaedic surgery items, 150 general surgery items and 188 cardiac surgery items.

"After the spinal surgery debacle, the AMA and the private health sector told the Department of Health that six months' lead time is needed ahead of MBS changes.

"More than two years later, we are facing the same problems, but with more than ten-fold the volume and complexity.

"This will put significant financial and operational risk on health insurers and private hospitals, and leaves doctors and patients scrambling and confused about what and how to bill against Medicare and private health insurance policies come July 1.

"We simply don't know what the rebates from funds will be, as they haven't had the time to prepare and release them in advance, including for surgeries already booked for next month."

Dr Khorshid said the AMA and other medical groups have worked in "good faith" with the Federal Government and the MBS Review Taskforce since 2015 to ensure value and sustainability across the Medicare system.

"We have repeatedly reached out to government and the Department of Health to communicate the needs of the sector to ensure a smooth transition of the MBS changes," Dr Khorshid stated.

"However, giving the sector just weeks instead of months to change over its entire system to support almost 1000 changes leaves the health system and

"At the moment there's no way for doctors to know if they are charging a gap due to the chaos caused by the Department's poor implementation.

"The AMA is calling on the government to urgently commit to changing the process going forward to avoid past problems and ensure that this massive change to MBS rebates occurs without disruption to patient care."

Senator Abetz said that since June 6, the Federal Government and AMA had reached a further agreement to co-design an administrative process which supports the implementation of future MBS review processes, saying the comments from Dr Khorshid were now "largely redundant".

"There was a media release that went out [June 8] showing that the AMA is in favour of the changes," Senator Abetz stated.

"Dr Omar Khorshid said, "The AMA supports the MBS review process and welcomes the commitment by government to work on process changes to the MBS review process to give additional time between public notice of the items and implementation"," quoted Senator Abetz.

Dr Khorshid had also commented that the AMA were concerned about rebates for their patients.

"We are also calling on the government and private health insurers to safeguard patient private health insurance rebates to ensure that they are not worse off financially, for undergoing orthopaedic, general or cardiac surgery after July 1 due to implementation issues with the MBS," Dr Khorshid said.

Senator Abetz responded by stating that there would be increased rebates and funding to Medicare, declaring it would be "a cold day in hell before the AMA would support" reductions in rebates.

"The facts are the government is continuing to massively increase funding of \$6 Billion for Medicare over the budget cycle," Senator Abetz commented.

"There is a wide range of items that have increased rebates across orthopaedics, plastic and reconstructive surgery, general surgery and gynaecology.

"For example, some items related to ankle fractures, clavicle fractures, oesophagectomy and pancreatectomy rebates have increased.

"A total of \$711.7 million will be invested in the 2021/22 Budget for new and amended MBS items."

Some new items which will be funded through MBS changes include Repetitive Transcranial Magnetic Stimulation (rTMS) therapy, ambulatory blood pressure monitoring, plastic and reconstructive surgery items, including general and skin surgeries, cranio-

Next generation of environmental champions

Four primary schools in Kingborough have been awarded grants of up to \$1000, to help local students enhance native habitats, improve sustainable food production and recycling or support waste management projects at their school.

The schools which received the grants to foster the next generation of environmental champions include Channel Christian School, Calvin Primary School, St Aloysius and Southern Christian College.

Information about each of the schools' projects is available through the Woolworths Junior Landcare Grants website.

Bush tucker garden **Channel Christian School**

The aim of this project is to build a bush tucker garden which encourages children and the school community to interact with nature and learn about local indigenous culture through their senses and creative expression.

The children will be involved in designing the space, choosing plants, planting, maintaining, harvesting and cooking the foods that will be grown.

The expected environmental and educational outcomes of the project include children developing knowledge about indigenous plants and their care as well as learning skills and values which enable improved sustainability in the local school community.

Children will also be encouraged to reflect on ways of interpreting and engaging with the physical world and feel the health benefits of this creative expression.

Healthy hothouse Southern Christian College

The aim of this project is to build a five by three metre hot house and vegetable garden so that students can grow vegetables and herbs for an extended season.

The children will be involved in researching and planning the hothouse, propagating plants, planting seeds and seedlings, composting waste, watering, organic weed and pest control, harvesting, preparing and cooking vegetables and collecting seeds to start the process again next year.

The expected environmental and educational outcomes of the project include students learning about prime conditions in which to grow various plants in Tasmania, biodiversity, companion planting, sustainability and resource management, the life cycle of plants and healthy eating.

Junior school vegetable garden St Aloysius Catholic College

The garden space will offer students the opportunity to learn how to grow organic food and empower them with lifelong skills of healthy growing and eating while also developing an appreciation for their natural environment.

Children can get their hands dirty in an educational environment and will nurture all of the plants with a rotating roster.

These roles could include following seed packet instructions for planting, pruning, harvesting, compost rotation, sieving, watering, bed preparation, weeding, propagation, data monitoring, problem solving, fruit tree maintenance, plant identification, seed collection, recycling monitoring and more.

By starting at the primary school level, the aim is to educate families and children on the impacts of their waste. As the primary school students progress through to the middle campus and beyond, they will take their environmental practices with them and continue to be Earth conscious ambassadors.

Sustainable cycles **Calvin Primary School**

The aim of this project is to continue to build sustainable vegetable gardens, recycling solutions for school resources and reduce the amount of resources used schoolwide with goals to build social capital and encourage children to develop their understanding of

sustainability while interacting with the natural world and experiencing the health benefits of gardening.

The children will be involved in researching worms, worm farms and compost systems, building and creating new gardens and sustainable protective measures for the current gardens, educating the entire school on reducing, recycling and composting measures as well as planting and maintaining the vegetable gardens, worm farms and compost systems.

The expected environmental and educational outcomes of the project include reduction in the amount of waste going to landfill, increased understanding throughout the school community regarding reduce, reuse and recycle initiatives and the power of worms as

Crucial role in marine rescue

A new vessel will help the Volunteer Marine Rescue Kingborough provide additional services to various communities in its area of operations.

The replacement vessel, *Kingborough Rescue 1*, was funded by a \$137,752 grant from the Tasmanian Community Fund (TCF) and was commissioned at the Oyster Cove Marina in Kettering on June 10.

The group's commander Ben Podolak said the vessel was an 8.8 metre Noosa Cat fitted with twin Suzuki 250 horsepower outboard motors and can operate up to 30 nautical miles from land.

"Our previous marine rescue vessel was built more than 40 years ago and has been in service in Tasmania since 2006," Mr Podolak said.

"The new vessel has a proven hull design, modern outboard four-stroke engines and is fitted with current navigation and radio equipment, providing a safer and reliable vessel for our volunteers."

Mr Podolak said Volunteer Marine Rescue Kingborough was one of two Surf Life Saving Tasmania Volunteer Marine Rescue units located in the south of the state and played an important role in providing safety, education and awareness to the boating public, with the aim of reducing preventable drownings.

"Our volunteers play a crucial role in the provision of marine emergency response supporting emergency services within the area of Storm Bay, Fredrick Henry Bay, Bruny Island, D'Entrecasteaux Channel extending to Recherche Bay area and the Huon River, covering approximately 560 kilometres of coastline," explained Mr Podolak.

"The vessel and launching berth will enable faster response times in emergencies, provide assistance to Tasmania Police in a search and rescue capacity and provide water safety to a number of community groups.

"It has also expanded our coverage with the ability to travel to destinations including Maria Island, Tasman Island and all the way down to Recherche Bay."

TCF Chair Sally Darke said the Volunteer Marine Rescue Kingborough and

its services were essential to improving the wellbeing and health of the community.

"Our communities are evolving and the Tasmanian Community Fund is committed to enabling projects and programs that meet the changing needs of our communities," Mrs Darke expressed.

"We are looking forward to seeing the positive effects *Kingborough* Rescue 1 will have on the community."

After the commissioning, attending guests were invited to watch the launch of the vessel and take a short observation run on board.

The TCF was established in 1999 following the sale of a community asset. An independent funding body, TCF provides grants to community organisations that make a difference by improving social, environmental and economic wellbeing of the Tasmanian community.

Dogs can be a landlord's best friend

The Tasmanian Dog Walking Clubs Inc. (TDWC) has embarked on an ambitious initiative to improve rental prospects for dog owners.

Member clubs (Kingborough, Hobart, Huon and Derwent) already advocate for responsible dog ownership and dog-friendly public spaces, and now they are taking their advocacy one step further.

TDWC learned about an issue through the Dogs' Homes of Tasmania where many animal owners cannot find pet-friendly rental accommodation, at a time when Australians are increasingly renting for life.

Tenants across all demographics are severely limited in their rental options.

More than half of Australian households own a pet, and property damage by households with pets is no more likely than for those without, yet RSPCA estimates that 15 to 30 per cent of national pet

surrenders are due to rental restrictions.

"The good news is that we can take action to improve these outcomes, and action is being taken across Australia," said Jess Adams of TDWC.

"Change is desperately needed to keep dogs united with their families, as they contribute hugely to the mental and physical wellbeing of tenants, including seniors who rely on their dogs for companionship."

Kayla Burns, a portfolio manager at Charlotte Peterswald Property Management, used to rent with two dogs herself before working on the other side.

Meeting pets is something Kayla now looks forward to when conducting property inspections.

Kayla said a landlord can fall back on bond, as with all tenants as stated in the additional pet clause added to their lease, but in the few cases that pets have caused damage, tenants have more often than not been quick to rectify it themselves.

Many tenants find that doggy day care is a solution that keeps active dogs out of trouble during the day, while also benefiting their dog's wellbeing.

For Katrina Ward, a veterinarian and animal behaviourist as well as landlord, 'pets considered' for her rental property brought incredibly positive results.

"As a first-time landlord, I tended to tick the boxes that the rental agents suggested, or at least made more unlikely to be unticked," Dr Ward explained.

"After a few years of short-term tenancies, I had a conversation with a real estate acquaintance and asked how I could develop longer-term tenants.

"She looked through my checklist and, given that the property had a secure garden, her first suggestion was to make it pet-friendly.

"As a veterinarian, I was actually quite embar-

rassed that I hadn't checked that aspect.

"On making the property pet-friendly, I acquired residents who have stayed happily for over 10 years."

Container refund scheme consultation





Garden club growing

A single flowering red gum planted at Middleton marks a major milestone in the history of one of Tasmania's oldest gardening clubs.

Half a century ago, following bushfires which devastated the Channel and caused some heart-broken residents to leave the area for good, a gardening club was formed in an attempt to rebuild the spirit of a shattered community.

The club was called the Sunshine Gardening Club, which reflected the name of a local growers cooperative supplying fruit and vegetables to Hobart.

Since then, the club was later renamed the South Channel Garden Club and has grown to become one of the largest community groups in the area with more than 130 members, a busy calendar of events and

At a ceremony held at Middleton attended by past and present members, Member for Franklin, Dean Winter MP, helped to plant the tree celebrating the club's 50th anniversary.

"It was a privilege to be invited along to the event,"

"The club is an important part of the southern Channel community and continues to be an avenue for friends and neighbours to connect, volunteer and make valuable contributions to the local community.

"It was a great afternoon to acknowledge the hard work of so many people over the 50 years.

"Thanks especially to Mark Harrison and Katherine Browne for putting the event together."

The flowering red gum, corymbia ficifolia, joined two other similar trees planted in the garden area at Middleton Hall marking the club's first and 10th

Following a Welcome to Country by Sarah Wilcox, the important role of volunteers in the community was highlighted by Mr Winter.

Mr Winter said that Kingborough has one of the highest rates of volunteering in Tasmania and this, coupled with vibrant community groups like the South Channel Garden Club, made Kingborough an attractive place to live and he wished the club continued success over the

The tree planting was the last in a program of events marking the half century, which included a lunch attended by Governor of Tasmania, Her Excellency, Professor, the Honourable Kate Warner, who is herself a keen gardener.

After the planting, members gathered for afternoon tea to reminisce about the highs and lows of the club's history.

At times during the late 70s, the club had so few members it had difficulty meeting its hall rental payments and to cut costs the meetings were often held at the homes of members.

At one point in the 90s the club faced the unwelcome prospect of either winding up or merging with another gardening club to survive.

Thankfully, the turn-of-the-century saw a major growth spurt and the club flourished with a wideranging program of events including garden visits, workshops and guest speakers, among which was the ABC's Tino Carnevale.

The club has previously organised two successful garden trails, with members opening their gardens as part of self-drive tours of the south Channel

Both events sold-out and raised money for community

A third trail is planned for November 2021

The club has also produced a booklet entitled Fertile Ground, marking its first 50 years and the social changes in the Channel area.

Members now look forward to further growth alongside the new red gum in the grounds of Middleton

The Club received \$35,000 to assist with the cost of resurfacing Court 4 through the Sport and Recreation Improving the Playing Field Grants program 2020-2021.



Grants to boost mental health

Grants open for safety initiatives

Safety initiatives across Kingborough may be able to access a boost through Round 6 of the Safer Communities Fund, with applications for

The Federal Government has committed to providing \$20 million in funding for early intervention projects and \$10 million for security infrastructure through round six of the Safer Communities Fund.

Local Senator Eric Abetz said this funding could help ensure people in the Kingborough community feel safe

as they go about their daily lives. "We'll continue to work closely with local councils and local community organisations to identify infrastructure projects that can be supported through this funding,"

Acting Mayor of Kingborough and Chair of the Kingborough Community Safety Committee (KCSC), Cr Jo Westwood confirmed that Kingborough Council and the KCSC are exploring opportunities available through

the grants program. "Council is currently assessing the opportunities presented by the Safer Communities Infrastructure Grants," stated Acting Mayor Westwood.

"In particular, the Kingborough Community Safety Committee has a two-year action plan and will review the opportunity to apply for grant funding against this plan.

"An additional 18 CCTV cameras will soon be installed at Kingston Park and there might be other opportunities in this area relating to the grant funding.

The Safer Communities Fund is a long-standing program that has invested more than \$215 million since 2016 and provided over 600 grants directly to local

"Local communities can feel safer from violence, harassment and anti-social behaviour following these initiatives," Senator Abetz remarked. "The early intervention funding stream will help assist

young people at high risk from engaging in criminal or anti-social behaviour build resilience, cultural connections and job readiness skills. "The infrastructure funding will not only improve secu-

rity and protect communities through projects such as CCTV, fencing and bollards; it will also keep local people employed, boosting local economies. The early intervention grant opportunity closes July 22

and the security infrastructure grant opportunity closes




The Allstars entered Midnight, one of their Open Level 3 stunt teams, in the spectacular where they not only took out first place but also won overall Stunt Grand Champions.


