First female mayor for Kingborough

Kingborough Councillor Paula Wriedt has been elected as Mayor of Kingborough and Clare Glade-Wright has been elected as a councillor in the local government by-election, according to the Tasmanian Electoral Commission (TEC).

Ms Wriedt won the mayoral contest against six other candidates, with Clare Glade-Wright and Cr Gideon Cordover coming in second and third place after the final distribution of preferences.

First preferences saw Ms Wriedt receive 4083 mayoral votes, Cr Cordover receive 2641 votes and Glade-Wright on 2314 votes, when counting was completed on Wednesday, July 21.

In the nine-candidate contest for the position of councillor, Clare Glade-Wright had a significant win, receiving 56.88 per cent of the votes after final distribution of preferences, with David Bain coming in second place.

The candidates have been elected to serve until the next ordinary elections in 2022.

The response rate for the return of votes was only 50.74 per cent; with 14,297 declarations returned by the 28,176 people enrolled to vote across the electorate.

Deputy Mayor of Kingborough, Cr Jo Westwood welcomed the new mayor and councillor on July 22, noting the people of the municipality have elected a female mayor for the first time in its history.

"On behalf of the council, I congratulate Paula Wriedt on her election to Kingborough Mayor," Deputy Westwood said.

"Cr Wriedt has been on Kingborough Council since 2011 and prior to that she was a Minister in the State Government.

"With her 25 years of experience in representing our community, I am confident that Mayor Wriedt will be a strong advocate for Kingborough during this critical growth phase.

"This is an important and long overdue milestone for Kingborough, with Cr Wriedt becoming the first female mayor.

"I would also like to congratulate Clare Glade-Wright on becoming a Kingborough Councillor.

"She has already shown her dedication to the community through her regular attendance at council meetings over the last few years.

"Ms Glade-Wright has also shown her dedication to understanding the community through her consultation group, Thriving Kingborough."

Deputy Mayor Westwood also acknowledged that, as a result of the by-election, the municipality was now represented by more female representatives than male representatives, for the first time.

"This will be the first time that Kingborough Council has more female than male councillors, something that is still a rare occurrence in the Tasmanian local government sector," noted Deputy Mayor Westwood.

"Now we are a full team again we can work on the delivery of our 2021/22 budget with over \$20 million marked for infrastructure projects to support the local economy."

Kingston Park advancing to Stage 2

Kingborough Council is in the processes of seeking tenders for the development of Stage 2 of Kingston Park, which will provide open areas with dedicated spaces for bike riding, an amphitheatre and large events lawn.

Deputy Mayor of Kingborough, Cr Jo Westwood said the development will also include important CBD Links.

"The next stage of Kingston Park will complete this area of public open space and improve the connecting links to the Kingborough Community Hub, park and CBD," Deputy Mayor Westwood said.

"This next stage will cater for large outdoor events lawn, include public amenities and an undercover barbecue shelter.

"We are also really fortunate to have had great advice from a local exercise consultant, who volunteered his skills and experience to consult on the development of the exercise area."

Cr Amanda Midgley said she was very excited about the cycling and open spaces that this next stage would offer.

"There will be shared paths for cyclists and pedestrians as well as a beginner's pump track," Cr Midgley said.

"Importantly, this next development will offer a well-lit, three-metre wide pathway encompassing the perimeter of Kingston Park.

"This will help link Kingston Park to the CBD and surrounding areas."

Community Wellness Adviser, Jim Preece commented on the process of working with Kingborough Council in the development of the exercise areas.

"Working with council, we have designed a community fitness and wellbeing asset that will provide free outdoor gym facilities," said Mr Preece.

"This will cater to everyone from the elderly and low mobility users, all the way through to the elite level athletes and sporting teams.

"All the equipment will have QR codes that link to videos to explain how to use the equipment, suggested workouts and the facility to set up community fitness challenges.

"The new stage is made up of three separate work-out hubs and with over 20 pieces of equipment.

"It will be the best of its kind in the state."

Kingston Park Stage 1 saw the building of the play equipment and adventure areas for children and families, while Stage 2 will cater for a broader range of the community.

"There will be areas for small and large events, with a grass banked amphitheatre and large event lawn to have access to three-phase power for concerts and other large-scale community events, such as carols by candlelight," Deputy Mayor Westwood said.

Public comments are invited to provide input to a study to identify issues and possible improvements along the Huon Highway from Kingston to Southport.

The Huon Highway Corridor Study aims to consider the likely transport demand over the next 30 years on the arterial road.

The community feedback as part of the study will help

the Tasmanian Department of State Growth understand the concerns the community currently has with the road, including current road characteristics and how the road performs in relation to road safety, travel times, road design and road condition.

The study will also review the priority list of projects from the 2012/13 Huon Highway Corridor Study.

A prioritised list of road improvement projects is to be

developed.

The corridor study is divided into two sections:

- Huon Highway: Kingston to Huonville
- Huon Highway: Huonville to Southport

Stop environmental by-law chop

Taroona residents fear proposed moves by Kingborough Council, in response to changes in State Government legislation, to remove a local tree-protection by-law will result in the loss of important habitat for the critically endangered Swift parrot and ruin the area's reputation as an ecologically sustainable place to live.

Taroona Community Association President Jill Hickie said her group and the Taroona Environment Network are calling on Kingborough councillors to reject the proposal to weaken the tree protection by-law.

"Kingborough draws people because it is a clean, green beautiful place to live, and the by-law protecting significant habitat trees like our big old blue gums has played a critical role in making our community such a special place," Ms Hickie said.

"Our trees are so important to the character of Kingborough and make it such a beautiful and ecologically sustainable place to live.

"Kingborough councillors have a duty to protect the natural values of Kingborough and that means protecting our beautiful native trees, including the

big old blue gums that provide food and breeding sites for critically endangered Swift parrots.

"The proposal would remove Part 7: Trees on Private Property from the Kingborough Council Environmental By-Law," Ms Hickie explained.

"Currently, this part prevents the damage of high conservation value trees or trees that are on the significant tree register without a permit.

"The council proposal has been informed by legal advice that this by-law will be in conflict and inconsistent with the new planning scheme.

"We have received legal advice from the Environmental Defenders Office that the current by-law is not in conflict with any planning scheme in the municipal area," Ms Hickie said.

"Advice obtained from the Environmental Defenders Office states that 'given the likely reduction in protection afforded to vegetation under the incoming Tasmanian Planning Scheme, it is even more important that the council includes protections of a similar nature of Part 7 of the current by-law'."

Ms Hickie said there has been a lack of transparency in

the process and that the community had not been given enough time to consider such an important matter.

She is aware of a large number of community groups that have similar concerns.

"Proper engagement sessions should have been provided to the community on this very important issue," Ms Hickie said.

"It is clear that planning controls are going backwards in Kingborough with this retrograde proposal to remove the tree protection by-law.

"This obviously will make it faster, cheaper and easier for developers to clear our beautiful iconic and high conservation value habitat trees of Kingborough.

"We also are concerned that council officers are not sufficiently informing councillors on this matter, which is deeply troubling."

The Taroona community groups' concerns follow an outpouring of similar concerns expressed by other community members and councillors, including Cr Gideon Cordover and Cr Flora Flox, as reported in last week's *Kingborough Chronicle*.

Mental health management

A free online mental health platform was launched on Thursday, July 15, to support Kingborough businesses and the wider Tasmanian community in aiding their employees with their mental health.

Minister for Workplace Safety and Consumer Affairs, Elise Archer MP said the Head4Work website is designed with both workers and management in mind.

"The Head4Work platform aims to support workers to better understand how to manage mental health risks at work, along with showing managers what they can do to support their staff," Minister Archer remarked.

"This past year has been extremely challenging as businesses and the community have responded to the COVID-19 pandemic and Head4Work will help those Tasmanian businesses and their employees that have done it tough and need extra support."

Minister Archer added the State Government is committed to workplace safety in all areas.

"We know that employers who take steps to understand the importance of supporting good mental health in the workplace will inevitably reap the rewards of a happier, healthier and more productive workplace," continued Minister Archer.

"The Head4Work platform is easy to use, can be accessed anytime and on any device, and requires no prior knowledge of workplace mental health."

The website was developed by Roar Educate, and is supported by the Tasmanian Chamber of Commerce and Industry (TCCI) through a grant to the TCCI's Work Health and Safety Advisory Service, which was funded by the WorkCover Tasmania Board.

Reality check in

The Tasmanian Government is calling on Kingborough businesses to register their venue on the Check In TAS app and help keep their community open for business.

As of July 31, more business types will be required to use the app and customers will be required to check in.

Minister for State Growth, Roger Jaensch MP said Tasmanian businesses should be proud of their efforts.

"With over 28,000 registered venues, businesses around the state can be proud of how quickly they have adopted the Check In TAS app and embraced the QR process, which builds on strong internal safeguards already in place," Minister Jaensch stated.

"It's important that we continue to do everything we can to keep Tasmanians safe and I thank businesses of all sizes for playing their part in strengthening our ability to track and trace should a COVID-19 case be detected in Tasmania."

With the virus currently spreading rapidly across mainland Australia, mostly due to the significantly increased infectivity of the Delta strain, there are rapidly changing travel restrictions and advice from the Tasmanian Government

The community can help prepare for any Tasmanian outbreaks by following all Public Health advice.

With high-risk locations declared for South Australia as of 4pm on July 20, as well as the expansive list of high-risk locations across both Victoria and New South Wales, the reality is that there is an increased risk of the coronavirus returning to Tasmania.

.tas.gov.au/ This also increases the responsibility of individuals and businesses within the Kingborough community to follow Public Health requirements and keep each other safe.

Minister Jaensch spoke about the importance of businesses signing up and being prepared for future requirements, emphasizing that it is critical not to become complacent.

"I encourage any business yet to sign up, to get the systems in place now and ensure they meet the requirements and their customers' expectations," recommended Minister Jaensch.

"We must remain vigilant and ensure that we are ready to act should a potential or positive case emerge.

"That's why, by July 31 we are expanding the range of premises required to use the Check In TAS app to include retail premises, such as supermarkets, shopping centres and Big Box outlets, as well as accommodation premises, educational settings and aged care locations.

"To support businesses as they move to adopt the process, we are also developing further resources and tools and we will continue to work with businesses to ensure they are confident in their communication with customers and patrons.


"The Tasmanian Government's number one focus remains the health and safety of all Tasmanians which is why it's so important that we do everything we can to ensure that if COVID-19 reaches our shores we are well-placed to minimise any impact on Tasmanians," Minister Jaensch concluded.

Short term State Government decisions overriding Kingborough Council's environmental management

As Kingborough's longest serving councillor, I provide a long-term view. For 30 years I have been advocating for the use of long-term strategies. Many have been adopted by council to make Kingborough one of Tasmania's favourite places to live. For the last 30 years, council has had a long-term vision for Kingborough, with a Planning Scheme which provides certainty and direction for infrastructure, industry, commerce, and housing. The State Government and the Planning Commission should have similar long-term plans for integrating planning of subdivision and infrastructure, including roads and transport. Instead, the State Government and the Planning Commission are over-riding Kingborough Council with their short-term views, forcing council to put up the rates to cover the costs. Recently the State Planning Commission over-rode council and allowed the large scale removal of valued, mature native trees at Spring Farm. This contributed to the catastrophic flooding of White Water Creek last winter. National Tree Planting Day drew over 200 community members, adults and children, to plant trees in Huntingfield.

The community sees the loss of trees in Kingborough and wants to take positive action, by planting trees, rather than feeling helpless and overwhelmed. Council has by-laws which need regular review and updating. This year we have asked the community for their input. We have also asked for legal advice to make sure that the bylaws fit into the current legislation governing councils. To our dismay, Kingborough Council's legal advice stated that the council's Environmental By-Law would no longer be legal, due to changes in the State Planning Scheme. This is yet another assault by the State Government on the Kingborough's quality of life, which the community values. Council wants to protect our natural environment. Overseas, the most desirable and expensive suburbs have the most trees. Kingborough residents and Council have been leading the way in environmental protection and management for many years. Kingborough's Environmental By-Law has been a significant tool in achieving these aims. The Planning Scheme should be changed to include the By-Law objectives to protect our natural assets. History shows that whales, Tasmanian Tigers, scallops, orange roughy and the saw-milling industry have all collapsed due a short-sighted State Government. We need long term planning to keep Kingborough a beautiful place where people want to live.

Your COVID safety kit

Tasmanians have been keeping on top of COVID but Kingborough community members must remain aware of the ongoing threat.

Other Australian states and territories have had to respond to recent new COVID-19 cases in their communities, showing how quickly things can change. These responses include requiring the community to take extra precautions, such as wearing face masks, to protect themselves and others around them. By having a few items ready everyone can be prepared if further community restrictions are introduced in Tasmania to respond to cases in the community. The items in the kit can play an important role in daily life right now to help keep each person and their loved ones safe. This means that the best time to prepare and start using a COVID-19 safety kit is now. In addition to COVID safe behaviours, having a COVID safety kit ready will help in the efforts to continue to keep on top of COVID in Tasmania. There are four items recommended for everyone to have in a COVID safety kit.

Face masks

Keep some masks at home and one on your person, e.g. keep one in a bag, pocket or with you at work. Face masks are mandatory for all people aged 12 or older at Tasmanian airports and on board all aircraft, including scenic flights. They are also required at the Spirit of Tasmania terminal and on board the boat. Masks may become mandatory in other public settings as part of community restrictions. Those who haven't worn a mask before, should get familiar with how to wear a mask now so that they are prepared.

A face mask should be worn over both the nose and mouth.

Tissues

Keep tissues at home and in other places where time is frequently spent. Small tissue packets are great for carrying in a pocket or bag. Cover all coughs and sneezes and with a clean tissue. Dispose of used tissues in the bin straight after use and wash hands well with soap and warm running water, or use hand sanitiser if soap and water aren't available.

Hand sanitiser

Keep hand sanitiser close by when possible and have some at home. Use it regularly on hands when there is no access to soap and warm water to wash them. A small bottle of hand sanitiser in a pocket or backpack is useful for many situations such as when travelling on public transport or when picking up a snack during a lunchbreak. It's also useful to have some at home should anyone in the household ever need to quarantine.

Check in TAS app


Check in by using the Check in TAS app when visiting businesses, venues and events. Checking in is important so that contact tracers can quickly identify and contact impacted locations and people if there is a case in the community. Checking in is compulsory so be prepared and download the app to a phone or smart device. After arriving at a location with a QR code displayed, simply scan the code to record a visit. Those who don't have a smartphone can ask another person in their group to check them in via their app, or staff at the premises can check people in.

No salmon impacts at Storm Bay

Huon Aquaculture is pleased to see positive results stemming from the first annual Yellow Bluff (Storm Bay) Broad-scale Environmental Monitoring Program (BEMP) report conducted by the Institute of Marine and Antarctic Studies (IMAS).

Peter Bender, Huon Aquaculture's Managing Director and CEO, said that based on the initial data and parameters surveyed, there is no evidence to suggest that farming at Huon's Yellow Bluff lease has had a system-wide influence on the water quality, soft-sediment and inshore reef habitats of Storm Bay. "The purpose of the BEMP program is to assess the environmental performance of salmon farming on the western side of Storm Bay, and to determine any impact from Huon's operations on the surrounding waterway," Mr Bender said. "The results of the Yellow Bluff BEMP are publicly available so that people can see for themselves, from a reliable and independent research institution, that our farming is having no impact." The BEMP was initiated in August 2019 to provide knowledge and information about the surrounding habitats in Storm Bay and looks at a nine-month period from August 2019 to April 2020. A BEMP program has also been operating in the D'Entrecasteaux Channel and Huon Estuary since 2009. Pene Snashall, Corporate Communications and Community Relations Manager for Huon Aquaculture also commented on the findings. "As we expected, independent research shows our salmon farming at the Yellow Bluff lease in Storm Bay is not having any impact," said Ms Snashall.

"The first annual Storm Bay BEMP report conducted by the Institute of Marine and Antarctic Studies was recently released and states there is no evidence that farming at the Yellow Bluff lease has had a system-wide influence on the water quality, soft-sediment and inshore reef habitats of Storm Bay." Mr Bender said key results showed a healthy canopy cover at all reef sites. "A wide range of sponge colours and forms can be seen including finger, cup-shaped, arborescent and encrusting, plus an extensive list of fish species were observed." The observations from the ROV surveys in 2020 indicate that the deep reefs in Storm Bay had not changed since previous baseline surveys. While there were elevated levels of nutrients and chlorophyll a, these appear to be linked to the movement of wider scale natural water bodies into Storm Bay, rather than any farming influence. "Storm Bay is a dynamic system and one that is well suited for Huon's operations," said Mr Bender. "The impacts of farming are well understood both beneath our pens, 35 metres outside the leases and within the broader farming area. "The transient nature of these influences have been subject to an extensive amount of scientific investigation." Research across Storm Bay and the Huon and D'Entrecasteaux channel is ongoing and the results directly influence Huon's operations. "Three exercise nodes will be included, with equipment focusing on weightbearing exercises and with one node to include a 20m track that can be used for interval training," Deputy Mayor Westwood continued. "Throughout the extensive consultation process,

undertaken by council over the last three years, over 2000 community members provided feedback on what they wanted to see developed in the Kingston area.

"The community told us they wanted more attractive green areas with improved links for pedestrians and cyclists.

"The Kingston Place Strategy 2020-2050 is a fantastic road

map, which is guiding us through the stages of transforming Kingston into a green, walkable and engaging regional hub.

"Kingston Park Stage 2 will build on Kingborough Council's vision to create a diverse range of engaging open spaces for the community that encourage social participation and connection in an attractive environment."

Free access to services and support

Residents of Kingborough needing to access support services will now have access to a new online directory, allowing them to find information on a range of different organisations in the area.

A partnership of community services organisation banded together to create the website, called FindHelpTAS, which was launched on Wednesday, July 14.

The comprehensive online community service directory provides free access to information on a range of services that support the health and well-being of Tasmania's communities.

The website contains a search engine which allows users to filter the services by type and location.

Some of the services available include support for; emergency food relief, domestic violence, sexual assault, disability, mentoring, employment, financial counselling, gambling, school leavers, LGBTIQ+, families, youth and parenting.

Hobart City Mission CEO Mr John Stubbley said the pandemic really proved how vital it is that Tasmanians can easily find the community services they need and access them in a way that suits them.

"Over the past 12 months, the industry and our partners sought information on emergency relief services and food relief in growing numbers," Mr Stubbley said.

This has resulted in many new linkages and collaborations being forged.

"FindHelpTAS is for everyone, from individuals and carers through to community service providers and GPs.

"It's important that we have all the incredible support options available in this state in one place."

According to Mr Stubbley, the directory features listings from 400 community service organisations across the state with the database growing daily.

TasCOSS CEO Ms Adrienne Picone said FindHelpTAS was designed with the user in mind.

"We really focussed on making the site and resources functional and easy to access so Tasmanians could find the support they need; whether it's online, over the phone or in their local community," Ms Picone said.

"The new FindHelpTAS website has an easy-to-navigate interface that works on any device and the ability to search in your council area, region, suburb or postcode or with the handy map.

"Printed directories are also available for community members who are unable to access their information via the internet."

FindHelpTAS is a self-funded community initiative led by Tasmanian community service organisations, supported by TasCOSS and the partners of FindHelpTAS; Anglicare Tasmania, Colony 47, Relationships Australia Tasmania, Uniting, Hobart City Mission, The Salvation Army, Mission Australia, Baptistcare and CatholicCare Tasmania.

The collective are committed to providing this free online directory to all Tasmanians.

Phasing out plastic pollution

This month, the Kingborough community are being encouraged to take part in Plastic Free July.

The State Government is encouraging Tasmanians to be part of the solution to plastic pollution.

"When we each do a little, together we can achieve a lot," stated Minister for the Environment, Roger Jaensch MP, on July 17.

"All Tasmanians are invited to get involved in the movement and to make a change so that we can achieve cleaner streets, oceans and parks."

Suggestions for reducing and/or replacing daily plastic use include:

- Bringing reusable shopping bags;
- Choosing products with minimal packaging;
- Refilling a drink bottle instead of buying bottled water;
- Buying reusable containers for storing food;
- Choosing food packaged in reusable or recyclable containers;

- Bringing a reusable coffee cup or dining in;
- Organising or taking part in a beach clean-up; and
- Saying 'no thanks' to plastic straws.

Minister Jaensch also said the government are committed to taking strong action on a broad range of waste management and resource recovery issues in Tasmania.

"This includes our commitment to phase out single use plastics from government and council facilities and events held on publicly owned land across the state by 2023, as well as our plan to phase out problematic and unnecessary plastics by 2025," said Minister Jaensch.

"We are investing \$1 million over four years to implement our single use plastics commitment, including \$100,000 to encourage innovative ideas from small businesses to start this journey.

"The phase out will result in single use plastic products being replaced with alternatives that can be reused again and again."

As well as phasing out single use plastics, there is also

a focus on responsible management of recyclable plastic.

In this theme, Minister Jaensch recently announced the successful applicants of the Recycling Modernisation Fund Grants.

"Three innovative projects will receive \$11 million of funding between them to increase our plastics reprocessing capacity, including one that has the potential to reprocess all of Tasmania's used plastic milk bottles, helping to build a circular economy in Tasmania," declared Minister Jaensch.

"And, importantly, we remain committed to introducing a Container Refund Scheme in Tasmania which will dramatically reduce the littering of plastic containers and increase the recovery and recycling of those materials."

Third garden trail for the Channel

The South Channel Garden Club is hosting the third in its series of popular biennial garden trails in November.

E-scooters expected in summer

E-scooters are expected to be approved for use in Kingborough streets by summer, providing a cost-effective, low-pollution, congestion-busting, transport alternative in Tasmania.

E-scooters and other personal mobility devices such as e-skateboards and 'hoverboards' will soon be allowed to be used by both commercial hire and ride operators and by private users on footpaths, shared paths and local roads.

Under the current regulatory framework, e-scooters with a maximum power output of more than 200 watts are classified as motor vehicles and are not permitted on any public street, road, footpath, shared path or open public space.

Minister for Infrastructure and Transport, Michael Ferguson MP said this means that most e-scooters now on the market cannot legally be used for transport.

"The Tasmanian Government has identified amendments to the regulations required to allow these modern e-scooters to be used at certain speeds on most local roads, footpaths, shared paths and bicycle paths and will work with stakeholders including local government on their formalisation and adoption," Minister Ferguson stated.

"Once we legalise the use of these e-scooters, anyone 16 years of age or older will be able to use an e-scooter as long as they wear a helmet and comply with all of the road rules, including speed limits.

"They will not be able to be used on main roads or highways.

"Users should also only use these devices in the public areas if they can do so safely and responsibly and they need to be aware that they may be held liable if they injure someone, damage property or cause a crash when using an e-scooter in a public place," Minister Ferguson warned.

A public education campaign on the legal and safe use of e-scooters will be rolled out once the amendments take effect.

Disability gateway to support

A nationwide Disability Gateway is now available, providing information and services to help people with disability, their family, friends and carers to find the supports they need.

The Disability Gateway was launched in July along with an advertising campaign themed I can.

The Disability Gateway covers a wide range of support in areas of life such as employment, housing, health, education, income and financial support, subsidised transport options, legal and advocacy services.

The service can be used to find everyday living and leisure supports, such as various types of aids and equipment, shopping assistance, meal preparation and

delivery, organisations to help with cleaning and household chores, a sporting team that meets the needs of a person's disability or identifying local disability-related events.

The Disability Gateway is available online at www.disabilitygateway.gov.au or by calling 1800 643 787 Monday to Friday, from 8am to 8pm AEST.

Federal Senator for Tasmania, Eric Abetz, said the National Disability Gateway is a great initiative that will support the needs of the disability community in Kingborough.

"The disability community has multifaceted needs and finding information about policies, programs and

support available for individuals can be a challenge.

"This gateway is another way we are addressing that challenge and supporting the disability community," remarked Senator Abetz

"The Disability Gateway is fast, easy to use and offers a range of accessible features for people with disability, including an Easy Read toggle on every page.

"The government worked extensively with the disability sector to build a fit-for-purpose source of information and it will help our community to access advice and referral services easily.

Call to fund suicide prevention commission

Shadow Health Minister Dr Bastian Seidel has called for the establishment of an independent suicide prevention commission following a report revealing Tasmania's age-standardised suicide rates are now Australia's second highest.

In a media release on July 21, Dr Seidel said the report released by the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare showed 108 Tasmanians took their lives in 2019.

"It is tragic that suicide remains the number one cause of death for younger Australians aged between 18 and 24 and up to nine suicides each month in Tasmania is just devastating," Dr Seidel said.

"Suicide has an overwhelming effect on families

and communities but it's unacceptable that there has been such inaction and failure to address critical mental health issues on Mr Rockliff's watch, as the Minister responsible for Mental Health for the past two years.

"Tasmanians do not need more reviews or discussion papers or more tokenistic words of comfort from this minister, they need action and they need a genuine effort to address mental health and suicide prevention.

"That includes a whole-of-community approach."

According to Dr Seidel, this would include working with mental health organisations and, as a matter of urgency, fund the establishment of an independent Suicide Prevention Commission in the next budget.

TasTAFE agriskills trio

Kingborough residents wanting to upskill in areas across the agricultural industry can now take advantage of TasTAFE courses offering three different skill sets.

TasTAFE's Agriskills Entry program aims to help Tasmanians to gain the skills needed by the agriculture industry.

Minister for Skills, Training and Workforce Growth, Sarah Courtney MP announced the opening on Sunday, July 11.

"Last year, TasTAFE delivered more than 120 skill sets through the Agriskills Entry program to help build Tasmania's fruit growing, vegetable, livestock and dairy workforces," commented Minister Courtney.

"Developed between TasTAFE and Fruit Growers Tasmania, the Agriskills Entry Program is an industry driven skill set package that will supply new workers with the skills our agricultural businesses need.

"It's also a great starting point for people looking for a career in the Agriculture or Production Horticulture industries and will help build a skilled agriculture

workforce for Tasmania."

The 2021 program includes three groups of skill sets, which have been discounted this year to be attractive to new entrants to the industry.

Skill Set 1 focuses on first aid, manual handling and the operation of quad bikes and chainsaws.

Skill Set 2 covers skills and knowledge needed to operate a forklift truck, tractor and front-end loader operations.

Skill Set 3 focuses on applying chemicals to control pests, weeds and disease as well as how to transport and store chemicals safely.

These skills sets provide accredited training through a combination of online theory and face to face learning, with participants able to choose to complete a single skill set or all three.

When successfully completed, participants receive a Statement of Attainment and credit towards a Certificate II or III in Agriculture.

Dire diabetes data

Kingborough community residents may need to monitor and nurture their health in light of the pandemic and should be aware of increased diabetes risks from the impact of restrictions on activity and lifestyles.

Real-time data from the SiSU Health Group has revealed an increased diabetes risk for most Australians, including a 1.6 per cent increase in Tasmania.

The risk of developing the disease has increased across all age groupings between 16 and 75 since the onset of the pandemic, as well as in all states except South Australia.

The data shows an average of 26.5 per cent of SiSU users were at high risk of developing Type 2 diabetes in 2021, compared with 24.5 per cent in 2019 using the AUSDRISK assessment method.

AUSDRISK is an Australian Government risk instrument to screen for future Type 2 diabetes.

The risk assessment tool was developed by the Baker IDI Heart and Diabetes Institute on behalf of the Australian, state and territory governments as part of an initiative to reduce the risk of Type 2 diabetes

A high AUSDRISK rating means an individual has a one in 14 chance of developing Type 2 diabetes in the next five years.

The data was collected from more than 300 SiSU Health stations positioned in pharmacies around the nation and released on Friday, July 16, as National Diabetes Week drew to a close.

SiSU Health Managing Director Dr Noel Duncan remarked that COVID restrictions and lockdowns are having clear consequences on the health and well-being of Australians.

"The health data portrays a concerning trend in recent months that carries ramifications for thousands of Australians, but it is also important to recognise the proactive steps within our control," said Dr Duncan.

"In this National Diabetes Week, we are trying to highlight that in more than half of cases, Type 2 Diabetes is a preventable disease.

"By monitoring your health and heeding early warnings, you can actually take measures to improve your

health."

While genetic disposition plays a strong role in development of Type 2 diabetes, the risk is greatly increased through insufficient physical activity, poor diet and obesity.

Smoking and high cholesterol are also risk factors. Dr Duncan said having access to immediate health feedback was a powerful tool not just for individuals, but also for the community in general.

"By painting a picture of population health and trends, real-time health data enables governments and organisations to invest in information campaigns and research that will make a real difference to community health outcomes," Dr Duncan explained.

SiSU health checks assess a range of health indicators including blood pressure, stress levels, weight and diabetes risk.

Data on smoking, diet and physical activity are also collected.

Six of the seven age groupings above 16 years of age showed a moderate increase in risk.

Only the oldest group, over 75-year-olds, remained static.

Similarly, nearly every state and territory showed an increase in the proportion at high risk, with Tasmania the third highest behind Northern Territory at 7.2 per cent and Queensland at 2 per cent.

Dr Duncan urged health authorities to respond to the increasing risk with targeted campaigns shaped by the data.

"If ever there was an opportunity to re-imagine and execute holistic, integrated preventive and population health strategies to enable Australians, and Australia, to successfully rebound in a post COVID period, it is now," Dr Duncan said.

The volume of data collected from the SiSU machines is 30 times larger than Australia's National Health Survey for the same collection period.

SiSU Health Stations are deployed across Australia in retail locations such as Priceline Pharmacies and in workplaces such as Commonwealth Bank.

The company has also deployed its Health Stations in the UK, Ireland and Germany.

Mission Australia's youth survey closes soon

Mission Australia is calling for young people in Tasmania to complete its Youth Survey before it closes.

For 20 years, the largest survey of its kind has been the barometer of what young people are experiencing, thinking and feeling.

The Youth Survey 2020 was completed by more than 25,800 young people aged between 15 and 19 years, including 739 young people in Tasmania.

Last year, young people from Tasmania nominated the environment, equity and discrimination and mental health as the most important issues facing Australia today.

Mission Australia said more than four in 10 young people from Tasmania named the environment as the most

important issue in Australia today.

The top three issues of personal concern for young people from Tasmania were coping with stress, mental health and school or study problems.

Close to half of respondents from Tasmania indicated they were extremely or very concerned about coping with stress.

Mission Australia State Director Mychelle Curran said the survey plays a critical role in understanding what many young people are thinking.

"In 2021 as the impacts of COVID-19 become clearer, it is important for Tasmania's young people to express their aspirations, issues and concerns," she said.

"This year's Youth Survey includes focus questions to reveal insights into young people's housing situation,

disability and experiences of discrimination, along with new questions to better understand the impact of COVID-19 and stress management.

"Young people have endured a lot during the past 18 months, including disruptions to their education, facing fresh barriers to employment, housing instability and unaffordability, mental health challenges and natural disasters," Ms Curran said.

"The results provide invaluable insights and an important source of information frequently cited by organisations and governments, and often tapped into by families and individuals to develop a picture of what our young people are thinking and experiencing.

"Encourage your young people to jump on the Mission

Australia website, fill out the survey and tell us how they are feeling", said Ms Curran.

"We are calling on the community to help us spread the word, whether that's sports teams, youth groups, schools or churches."

For those who would like to have their say, time is running out.

Mission Australia's Youth Survey 2021 is applicable to all young Australian residents aged 15-19 years-old and is open until August 9.

It only takes 20 minutes to complete, with results expected to be released in early December.







Burn brighter this winter

Environmental Protection Authority (EPA) Tasmania and local councils are encouraging wood heater users to burn with a flame or burn brighter this winter to reduce wood burn and smoke emissions.

While wood heaters are a common way to heat homes during winter, burning without a flame or burning wood overnight can often result in thick smoke around towns and suburbs across Tasmania.

Dr John Innis from EPA Tasmania says air quality monitoring undertaken across Tasmania shows that there is poor air quality in several locations during the winter months.

"On still winter days and nights, smoke tends to linger and build up around towns and suburbs, which is unpleasant, can be a nuisance and can also have negative consequences on our health," Dr Innis stated.

Director of Public Health, Dr Mark Veitch would like to remind Tasmanians that wood smoke reduces the quality of air and can worsen conditions such as asthma, bronchitis, emphysema and heart disease.

"The smaller particles in wood smoke, when breathed in, can directly enter the bloodstream, causing inflammation and worsen these existing conditions," Dr Veitch said.

Dr Innis says the amount of smoke coming from a

wood heater is dependent on the age and type of heater, but also on how it is operated.

The good news is that wood can be burnt in a way that creates less smoke.

EPA Tasmania's Burn Brighter this Winter campaign provides advice about how to operate a wood heater to reduce smoke emissions:

- Always burn with a flame, don't let a fire smoulder.
- After loading wood, open the air control and burn the fire on high for 20 minutes, especially before going to bed.
- Only burn dry, seasoned wood.
- Ensure the flue is clean.
- If possible, go outside occasionally and check how much smoke is coming from the chimney.

If it is regularly producing a lot of smoke, even with good operation, the heater may need to be serviced or the flue may need to be cleaned.

Winning angle on trout

With the brown trout season opening on Saturday, August 7, Kingborough anglers have the opportunity to claim one of 50 tagged trout, each worth \$2000.

Fifty tagged brown trout have been released into 15 waters around Tasmania, with each tag worth \$2000 to the angler who returns the tagged fish to the Inland Fisheries Service.

Last year, five tagged trout worth \$10,000 were released and only one was caught.

The remaining four fish from last year are no longer eligible for prizes.

The 15 waters and number of fish are: Arthurs Lake (5), yingina/Great Lake (5), Lake Mackintosh (5), Lake Pedder (5), Lake Burbury (5), Lake Rosebery (5), River Derwent (3), Derby's Briseis Mine Hole (2), Bronte Lagoon (2), Craighourne Dam (2), Curries River Reservoir (2), Huntsman Lake (2), Lake Leake (3), Lake Parangana (2) and Lake Rowellan (2).

The State Government has also waived junior angling licence fees for the next four years and frozen the price of adult licences to the 2017-18 level in an effort to boost the sport.
