Lines of cars stretched kilometres along local roads in several directions before a new drive-through COVID testing clinic officially opened at Kingborough Sports Centre on Wednesday, January 5. Many residents were turned away, as Tasmania reached a daily record of 867 new COVID cases, and with a total of 3118 reported active cases. The State Government reported up-to-date figures on Monday, January 10, with 1218 new infections and 7917 active cases reported.

Virus testing turnaround

Residents were turned away in droves on the opening day of a new drive-through COVID testing clinic in Kingston on Wednesday, January 5, as Tasmania reached a daily record of 867 new COVID cases, and with a total of 3118 reported active cases.

The new drive-through testing clinic, located in a car park at the Kingborough Sports Centre, was scheduled to officially open at 10am on January 5. At the time, clinical polymerase (PCR) tests were required to be taken by people experiencing COVID symptoms and those defined as a 'close contact' of a COVID case.

Hundreds of people had queued in their cars prior to the opening time, some as early as 6am, desperate to have a COVID test.

The *Kingborough Chronicle* arrived at 10:15am on the official opening day to witness long lines of cars stretched kilometres along roads in several directions, blocking other traffic.

The cars that neared the final section of the queue were being turned around by the only traffic controller on site.

The traffic controller was tasked with telling the waiting motorists, one-by-one, that the clinic was overwhelmed and they should come back the next morning.

A staff member confirmed the site was "currently closed" as "people have been lining up since 6am" causing the testing clinic to reach capacity.

Some people were witnessed leaving their vehicles and walking to the drive-through testing tent, attempting to seek urgent testing and make enquiries.

At the time, Tasmanians who had obtained a COVID positive result from a rapid antigen test (RAT) were required to have a PCR test to validate the result.

The PCR test results had provided the daily COVID case numbers tallied by each State government, used to predict the surge in COVID hospitalisations.

However, at a meeting of National Cabinet on the afternoon of Wednesday, December 5, it was agreed to remove the requirement for a PCR test to validate a positive RAT result.

At the time the Kingborough Sports Centre COVID test clinic opened, Tasmania was also experiencing a shortage in supply of rapid antigen self-tests, with local pharmacies and supermarket stocks empty.

The Tasmanian Government had come under fire for opening the State border before children had received their first COVID vaccination, before much of the adult population had received vaccination boosters and without adequate supplies of rapid antigen tests available.

At the time, the Australian Government was also under fire for failing to secure enough supply of the rapid antigen tests, as the shortage impacts were felt nation-wide.

The Kingborough Sports Centre drive-through clinic is scheduled to open between 10am and 4pm, Monday to Friday and bookings are not required.

Bookings are required for the Hobart Macquarie Point COVID testing drive-through clinic and can be made by contacting the Public Health Hotline on 1800 671 738 or registering online at <https://covidtestbooking.health.tas.gov.au/>

General Practitioners may offer COVID-19 testing and may charge a consultation fee.

Snug aged care lockdown

Snug Village aged care reportedly went into lockdown on New Year's Eve after a staff member tested positive to COVID-19.

On January 3 it was reported that seven staff and one resident had tested positive. By Friday, January 7, Snug Village was one of 20 aged care homes in Tasmania impacted by COVID.

The *Kingborough Chronicle* wrote to Tasmania's Minister for Health, Jeremy Rockliff MP, regarding the situation on January 6.

"Can Minister Rockliff MP please provide a briefing regarding the Snug Village residential aged care facility situation so we can inform locals, as many people in the area visit the village.

"How many COVID cases have been detected amongst staff to date?"

"How many COVID cases have been detected amongst residents to date?"

"How many village residents had received their COVID vaccine booster (third vaccination) at the time the COVID case emerged?"

"How many village residents have now received three COVID vaccinations?"

"How many people reside at the facility?"

"Are village residents still locked down/isolated in their rooms?"

"What is the plan for the village residents moving forward?"

The *Kingborough Chronicle* was referred to Tasmania's Department of Health and is awaiting a response.

By January 7 there were 1489 new daily COVID cases in Tasmania.



Local people and business at risk

Epidemiologist, Greens Health Spokesperson and Member for Franklin, Dr Rosalie Woodruff MP said there is obvious community transmission and businesses are closing their doors.

"The predicted and rapidly unfolding COVID crisis is hurting Tasmania," said Rosalie Woodruff MP.

"Hundreds of people a day are being infected, testing is a mess and businesses are closing their doors.

"Since Peter Gutwein opened the State's borders and welcomed COVID to our island, we've gone from a confident and healthy island to a bunkered-down, infected community, with many living in anxiety.

"There is obvious community transmission, close contacts and symptomatic people are being turned away from testing clinics and businesses are closing their doors.

"The Premier bulldozed to open the borders, despite knowing almost nothing about Omicron, but in the full knowledge of unvaccinated under 12s and a fast-spreading new wave in NSW and Victoria.

"Tasmania is now in the grip of a serious health crisis and public confidence in the government's management of COVID has collapsed, largely because Peter Gutwein has stopped leading with care," said Dr Woodruff MP.

"We need to slow the rapid spread of COVID in the community, and we implore Peter Gutwein to put the needs of vulnerable people first.

"Slowing the virus is a multi-pronged strategy starting with closing the borders to high risk states, and using a short lockdown to allow the beleaguered public health response to catch up with the massive caseload.

"We urgently need to fast-track vaccines, more rapid antigen tests and staff for contact tracing, to continue quarantine, better masks (KF94, P2/FFP2, N95), and to improve indoor air quality," recommended Dr Woodruff MP.

"If the Premier continues this 'let it rip' strategy, he is responsible for every Tasmanian who tests positive, every person turned away from a testing clinic, and every business that closes its doors."

"After 22 months of putting public health first, and telling people how serious and debilitating COVID could be, the Premier has opened the border and walked away.

"The Premier must stop trying to normalise Omicron and put the health and safety of Tasmanians and local businesses first."

The *Kingborough Chronicle* wrote to the Premier of Tasmania, Peter Gutwein MP on December 7.

"Can Premier Gutwein please remind the Kingborough community why he chose to open the border on December 15?"

At the time of printing, no response had been received.

Long COVID

The *Kingborough Chronicle* also wrote to the Premier of Tasmania, Peter Gutwein MP, and Minister for Health Jeremy Rockliff MP on January 6 regarding the health impacts and risks associated with Long COVID.

"What advice has the Premier Gutwein and Minister Rockliff MP received regarding Long COVID health impacts and risks for Tasmanians?"

"Can Premier Gutwein and Minister Rockliff MP please advise the residents of Kingborough regarding Long COVID health impacts and risks?"

To date none of the above questions have been answered.



Urgent action and COVID support needed

Tasmania's government needs to be doing more to get Tasmania through the COVID pandemic, according to Member for Franklin, Dean Winter MP.

Mr Winter said it was now clear that the government's plan for reopening had failed and it was time they listened to community concerns.

"Here in Kingston we have seen the line for a PCR test stretch for hours and with RATs sold out it is incredibly difficult for people to know if they are COVID positive," said Dean Winter MP.

"The community has every right to be anxious, with businesses closing and our health system under enormous pressure.

"The Premier said we were ready and set the December 15 opening date, he needs to now tell Tasmanians why things haven't gone to plan."

Mr Winter said Labor had released a framework to assist the government get back on top of the virus.

"COVID is now in our community and the government need to act urgently to ensure people remain safe."

Financial support needed

Small and micro businesses impacted by COVID should not be "expected to bear the brunt" at this challenging time, according to Tasmania's Shadow Minister for Small Business, Janie Finlay MP.

Ms Finlay called on the Tasmanian government to reinstate support packages for business operators, as COVID numbers continued to rapidly rise on Saturday, January 8.

"With 97 per cent of Tasmanian businesses classified as small business, many of whom are sole operators, the government must act quickly to ensure that impacted Tasmanians are supported during this challenging time," Ms Finlay said.

"Many small and micro business operators have been impacted by rising COVID case numbers and are struggling to make ends meet, in some instances they have no choice but to close their doors.

"If a customer does not show for an appointment or if a courier or truck driver cannot work due to COVID restrictions, their revenue and livelihood is directly and adversely impacted as they are unable to absorb the losses elsewhere.

"The bills and overhead costs don't just stop.

"Businesses are expected to bear the brunt of this challenging time.

"This is not just about businesses closing their doors but those who are losing trade and having to make complex decisions in the best interest of their workers and the community.

"If the government's COVID modelling is correct and

they are confident that this virus will come and go in waves, then they should reinstate support measures immediately.

"The program is there and it has been used previously. Surely it's a no-brainer for the government to once again provide this critical support."

Tasmania's Minister for Small Business, Jane Howlett said "businesses can apply for funding under the COVID-19 Small Business Advice and Financial Guidance Program".

This includes places such as the supermarket, inside restaurants, and indoor workplaces.


You are not required to wear a mask inside a home – whether you live there or are visiting.

Excess speed major cause of road casualties

Excessive speed has continued to be the major cause of casualties on Tasmanian roads, with 35 lives lost and 242 people seriously injured in 2021.

Two people were killed over the period between Christmas and New Year.

One in three serious casualty crashes on Tasmanian roads involve excessive speed, according to the Road Safety Advisory Council.

Motorcyclists remain over-represented in casualty numbers, accounting for around a third of all serious casualties.

The RSAC has been urging Tasmanian motorists to slow down, with a campaign titled *Over is Over* launched in December.

RSAC chairman Scott Tilyard said too many road users

continue to engage in high-risk behaviours on our roads putting themselves and other road users at risk.

"Sometimes we're in a rush to get what we need or get to our destinations," commented Mr Tilyard.

"We might be tempted to go over the speed limit or answer that mobile phone text, but what might seem like a harmless action at the time can be fatal.

"It doesn't matter if you're speeding by 15 kilometres per hour or 4 km/hr.

"As speed increases, so too do serious casualties.

"Findings from RSAC's triennial attitudinal tracking research shows one in five Tasmanians find it acceptable to drive up to 10 km/h over the speed limit," Mr Tilyard noted.

"This shows Tasmanians aren't taking speeding seriously enough.

"As our new advertising campaign says, if you're driving even a few kms over the speed limit, it's over.

"*Over is Over* is our call for social responsibility.

"It challenges motorists to rethink their attitudes to speed and encourages them to adjust their behaviour by not driving over the speed limit, at any level.

"The 'fatal five' driving behaviours remain the highest contributors to serious casualty crashes.

"These are speeding, driving under the influence of drugs or alcohol, distraction, not wearing a seatbelt, and fatigue." In a media release on January 1, Minister for

Infrastructure and Transport, Michael Ferguson MP said last year 35 people lost their lives, which is only slightly down from 37 in 2020.

"In 2021 there were 242 serious injuries on our roads, down from 290 in 2020," noted Minister Ferguson.

"The 2021 figures also show that motorcyclists remain over-represented, accounting for around a third of all serious casualties.

"Concerningly, it seems some people just don't get the message, with alcohol or drugs and inattention being factors in about 22 per cent and 15 per cent of casualties respectively."

Concerns for children as vaccinations begin

While Queensland Premier Anastacia Palaszczuk has delayed the beginning of the school year in response to rapid increases in COVID positive cases, Tasmania's Minister for Education has said the priority is to see Tasmanian kids at school.

"We are committed to giving every primary school age child the opportunity to have at least one dose of the vaccine before schools return from summer holidays in February," said Sarah Courtney MP on January 9.

"In an effort to get as many Tasmanian children vaccinated before the new school year, dedicated children's clinics will be kicking off tomorrow right across the State.

"I would like to encourage all parents and carers to book their children into one of the special COVID-19 vaccination clinics for 5 to 11 year olds, as we know that vaccination is the best defence against the symptoms of COVID-19.

"The clinics are set up to deliver the special children's dose of the Pfizer vaccine which is a third of the adult dose and is recommended by health authorities as the most effective and safe way to protect your children from COVID-19.

"It's pleasing to see that more than 40 per cent of children aged 5 to 11 have already booked in for a COVID-19 vaccination appointment at a state-run vaccination clinic.

"This figure does not include bookings with GPs, who are also set to play an important role in vaccinating children in this age group.

"The choice to vaccinate children in this cohort, while strongly recommended, is entirely voluntary and will not be mandated," said Ms Courtney.

"In addition, the Department of Education is working closely with Public Health as we plan for the return of students to school on February 9."

Tasmania's Education Minister said any changes to the plan for students to return to school on February 9 based on Public Health advice will be communicated clearly with schools, communities and stakeholder groups.

"The Department of Education is currently implementing a range of measures in schools including natural ventilation improvements, air purifiers, enhancing outdoor learning and additional cleaning arrangements to ensure the safety of students," said Ms Courtney MP.

"Tasmanians are encouraged to continue to use common sense: wear your mask indoors, practice good hygiene, get tested if unwell even with mild symptoms and use the Check in Tas App."

Booster interval reduced

On December 24, Tasmania's Minister for Health, Jeremy Rockliff MP said the Tasmanian Government welcomed the reduction of booster dose intervals for Tasmanians aged 18 and over.

"I welcome the Australian Government's announcement that will see the interval between the second dose of the vaccine and booster shots forward," said Minister Rockliff.

"From 4 January, Tasmanians aged 18 and over will

now be eligible for a booster four months after their second dose, down from five months.

"The move follows new advice from the Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisations (ATAGI) that an earlier booster dose will strengthen protection against severe illness from COVID-19 and strengthen protection against transmission.

"This change will allow us to give Tasmanians extra early protection against COVID-19 and additional peace of mind as we learn to live with the virus.

"To date approximately 50,000 Tasmanians have already had their booster, 15,000 are booked in for a

booster in State clinics, and 40,000 are eligible and not yet booked in for a booster," said Minister Rockliff.

"We want to continue to protect the oldest and most vulnerable members of the community by giving people with the greatest time since their second dose the opportunity to book their booster now.

"For this reason, Tasmanians who will become eligible under the new rules, having had their second dose of the vaccine four months before 4 January 2022, are asked to wait until the New Year to make a booking with their vaccine provider, allowing those older and more vulnerable people the chance to receive their booster."



Cherry pickers needed

Cherry pickers are required in Huon Valley and Derwent Valley cherry orchards.

Reid Fruits Managing Director Tim Reid said "hundreds" of extra workers are required to pick cherries for the interstate and international export markets and people who have permanent jobs during the week can sign on and work weekends.

"We have an immediate need for 50 jobs in the Huonville packing house and up to 100 pickers in the Huon Valley orchards," Mr Reid said.

"We also need another 100 to 150 people in our Derwent Valley orchard.

"Picking jobs on these orchards will last for approximately three weeks, after which pickers will also have the opportunity to transfer from those two orchards to our late harvest orchard at Jericho in the Southern Midlands.

"Jobs at the late harvest orchard will continue until mid-February."

"You don't have to work flat out, just consistently," said Mr Reid.

"It's a great working environment, you are outside in the fresh air, the trees are not very high and the fruit is large and firm."

The orchards already have some 140 pickers through a Pacific Island program, mainly from Vanuatu, according to Mr Reid.

"We also have a great team of local pickers, including from Tasmania's migrant population, mainly from Bhutanese, Nepalese and African communities," said Mr Reid.

"The packing shed at Huonville is very popular with university students."



This appealing property with views, built circa 1974, is ideally located in Blackmans Bay.

It has newly polished and waxed timber floors and three, carpeted bedrooms with built-in wardrobes. The kitchen has been planned for easy use with heaps of cupboards, pantry space and soft close drawers. The north/east facing living area is flooded with sun all year round.

The home is freshly painted inside and out and there are new custom-made venetians and roller blinds throughout. There is a heat pump/air conditioner in the main living area and a large new panel heater for the hall and bedrooms. Underfloor and ceiling insulation have been installed. There is an NBN cable to the house.

The gardens are fully fenced and separate back and front fences with gates to circulate the property. It is on a single level, no more than a doorstep to navigate from the car to the view. The garden was carefully developed by a horticulturalist for easy maintenance.

Irrigation is installed through the garden beds. There are twenty fruit trees including a citrus screen planted below the water view, established and delicious apricots, greengages and plum and newly established espaliered apple and pear varieties as well as olive trees. Herbs border flower beds and there's a local natives zone. A raised veggie bed planted with tomatoes is ready for garlic or winter greens to follow.







Nurturing children's curiosity

Fahan School celebrates the natural curiosity of children and provides a nurturing and stimulating environment to grow and develop during the vital first years of education.

Kindergarten to Year 2 students have been enjoying a new style of learning that was introduced to the school's Early Learning framework a few years ago.

The program is designed to extend children's learning beyond their classroom and maximize the use of Fahan's kindergarten to Year 12 facilities.

Vertical grouping, as it is known, has been enthusiastically embraced by all.

Students from kindergarten to Year 2 participate each week in a range of activities in a rigorous and stimulating environment.

Working together in small, mixed-age groups, students participate in a variety of learning experiences, including:

- a gardening group that collect and press flowers to use in their own handmade paper;
- a tinker-lab group which pull apart machines to discover how they work and looked at different building materials;
- a science and technology group that work with bee-bots, magnets, electrical circuits and built solar lights; and
- a cooking group that make delicious items such as sushi, bread, pizza and fruit salad with ice-cream.

"I looked forward to vertical groups every week and my favourite activities were making muffins in the Food Hub, especially the icing, as well as coding the bee-bots in our science activity," said Year 2 student Mahveen Mudasar.

"My group created dances for the robots and then programmed them into the bee-bots."

"I really liked showing the kindergarten girls how to do some of our group activities," said Mahveen Mudasar.

"I loved working in the tinker-lab group," said Year 2 student Mila Schramm.

"There were lots of machines with screws that we could take apart, look inside and try to put back together.

"My group took apart a sewing machine one week and a keyboard another week."

"The best part about working with groups from kinder, prep and Year 1 is that we make friends and then play together out in the playground," explained Year 2

student Mila Schramm.

Research has highlighted the benefits for both teachers and children when learning and teaching in a multi-age classroom.

Benefits include more holistic, child-responsive curriculum practices that consider the understandings, capabilities and dispositions that children need for their future.

Children and teachers have the opportunity to work together for more than one year, which enhances continuity of learning and formation of positive relationships with teachers and children, and between children.

"Children benefit from learning in a multi-age and multi-disciplinary classroom environment," said Acting Head of Junior School, Susan Wright.

"Mixed age-groups provide younger children with exposure to, and therefore an ability to model, behaviours of older children, often aspiring to their levels of capability.

"In return, older children rise to the expectations of the younger children and act as mentors, becoming responsible and having opportunities to lend and use their expertise.

"Strong and robust programs such as this focus on maximising learning outcomes for all individuals and remind us how important it is, as educators, to be adaptable and creative."

Fahan Early Learning teachers are strong advocates of this style of learning, recognising the benefits from their experience in, and commitment to, the Reggio Emilia approach and the importance of inquiry-based learning that is integral to the teaching approach at Fahan.
