Huntingfield report on protected species

The Department of Communities Tasmania has published its *Preliminary Documentation Report and Public Comment Period Report* (dated June 16) for Stages 2 and 3 of its proposed Huntingfield development.

Department of Communities Tasmania referred Stages 2 and 3 of the Huntingfield Land Release Project to the Commonwealth Department of Agriculture, Water and Environment due to the potential for the project to impact Matters of National Environmental Significance, most notably the Forty-spotted pardalote, *Pardalotus quadragintus*.

The assessment document includes proposed avoidance and minimisation measures to mitigate the potential impacts identified for the listed threatened Forty-spotted pardalote species.

"The assessment also considers potential impacts to Swift parrots, *Lathamus discolor*, however it was determined that a significant impact to the species was not likely," notes the report.

"The *Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999* listed threatened ecological community, Tasmanian white gum (*Eucalyptus viminalis*) wet forest, was not listed for protection at the time of the referral and has only been considered in its capacity to provide habitat for Forty-spotted pardalotes

and Swift parrots."

In February this year, the community was invited to provide comments on each matter protected by a provision of Part 3 of the EPBC Act 1999: listed threatened species and ecological communities (sections 18 and 18 A).

Fatality at Longley

Sadly, a 43-year-old man from Ranelagh has died, and a 43-year-old woman from Ranelagh has received serious injuries, as a result of a single-vehicle crash on Huon Road at Longley, on Sunday, July 10.

"At approximately 12.30am on Sunday, the 10th day of July 2022, emergency services were notified of a serious, single-vehicle crash on Huon Road in the vicinity of the Longley Hotel," stated Tasmania Police.

"The male driver was located in the vehicle and declared deceased at the scene a short time later.

"A 43-year-old female, also of Ranelagh, was in the vehicle at the time of the collision

and received serious injuries.

"The vehicle involved in the crash is a red Nissan Micra.

"Initial investigations indicate the driver was traveling south on Huon Road when he failed to safely negotiate a right-hand curve in the road and collided with a concrete bridge.

"Vehicle speed and the use of alcohol is believed to be contributing factors to the cause of the crash, both occupants were wearing seatbelts.

"Anyone who observed the vehicle prior to the collision is asked to contact Crash Investigation Services on 6230 2111 or by contacting Crime Stoppers."

Custody, and medical needs

Dear Editor,
Last week I was arrested in takayna/Tarkine, while try-
ing to stop MMG from building a tailings dam in ecolog-
ically important forests.
I was refused bail and kept in remand for over 24
hours, awaiting a decision from a magistrate.
While I was in remand, I requested to see a medical
professional because I am on a daily dose of six types of
medication.
I supplied a medication letter from my GP, and my
lawyer requested I be given my medication at the earli-
est convenience, but for the entirety of my stay in prison,
I was not given my prescribed medications.
Popular opinion may indicate that I do not deserve
medication because I have broken the law.
But how do people decide whether prisoners can have
access to essential medication?
What if withholding medications cause a prisoner to
have a seizure or a cardiac arrest?
And what if the prisoner is later cleared of all charges?
Or if the prisoner, innocent or guilty, has ongoing issues
due to not receiving medication?

I am likely to go to jail for being a peaceful, forest
defender.
I will pay the price for breaking the law.
However, I hope the system recognises that just
because we break a law, it does not mean we shouldn't
receive timely medical attention.

Free flu vaccinations

**Free flu vaccinations will continue at GP clinics and
pharmacies in Tasmania until July 31.**
In a media release on July 4, Premier and Minister for
Health, Jeremy Rockliff MP said 1670 confirmed cases
of influenza have been notified to the Department of
Health so far this calendar year, as of June 26, with
weekly cases exceeding 350 per week in recent weeks.
"While almost three-quarters of Tasmanians over 65
have already had their flu shot, there is still 25 per cent
yet to receive a vaccine," stated Premier Rockliff.

"The free vaccines across GPs and pharmacies are in
addition to state-run flu vaccination clinics that will continue.
"If you haven't yet, please make an appointment now
to take advantage of this scheme and to ensure GPs
and pharmacies are able to order adequate stock."
Free flu vaccines are available at:
• GPs and state-run community clinics, for everyone
6-months-old and over.
• Participating pharmacies, for everyone 10-years-old
and over."

Gears switch to net zero

**The Net Zero Channel (NZC) group is planning a
series of local events aimed at cutting carbon
emissions in Channel communities, after receiving
a Kingborough Council grant of \$2900.**
Group members represent communities in Snug,
Coningham, Kettering and Woodbridge.
Kettering resident Phil Tomney said the local
campaign is grateful for financial assistance from
Council and community organisations in Snug/
Coningham and Kettering, which will "take the project
to the next stage".
"At a public meeting in May more than 100 residents
gave overwhelming support for the campaign to make
Channel communities the first in Tasmania to move
towards net-zero emissions," noted Phil Tomney.
"Now, with petrol and diesel-powered vehicles
among the key emitters of carbon, NZC is planning to
highlight the benefits of electric vehicles with a
display in mid-August at a venue in the Channel, with
experts on hand to answer questions from would-be
buyers anxious to make the switch.
"This is set to be followed by a screening, later in
the year, of the documentary *Regenerating Australia*
which presents ways Australia could transition to a
fairer, cleaner economy by 2030, if issues of climate
change and energy use were addressed.
"It features, among others, former broadcaster Kerry
O'Brien, footballer turned ACT Senator David Pocock
and environmentalist Tim Flannery.
"The screening will provide an opportunity for a
round-table discussion to identify the energy-use
concerns of Channel residents and ways of reducing
carbon emissions.
Dates for the screening and the EV display will be
announced later.
"Meanwhile, an NZC study group is investigating the
best way of establishing the carbon footprint of the
areas covered through a database on energy use in
homes and businesses, measured at regular intervals
with the aim of identifying community achievements
in cutting carbon."

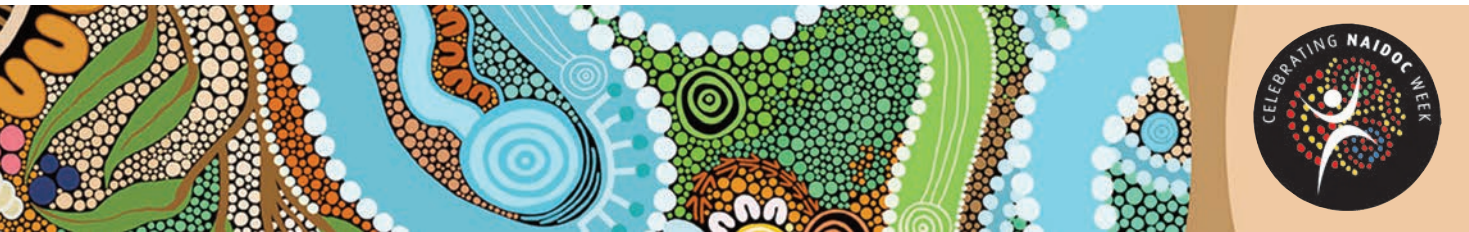

First Nations celebrated with art

A community art workshop took place in Kingborough on Wednesday, July 6, assisted by local artist and Melukerdee woman, Gemma O'Rourke.

Participants of all ages and backgrounds contributed to a collaborative painting using hands, brushes, paint, and charcoal sticks.

The NAIDOC Week 2022 event, hosted by Kingborough Council, provided an opportunity to learn about and celebrate Australia's First Nations art and culture, the oldest, continuous living cultures on earth.

The annual, national celebration recognises the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, was celebrated from Sunday, July 3 to Sunday, July 10 this year.

The art workshop was held at the Kingborough Community Hub and began with a walk to the Kingston

Playground and a Welcome to Country.

Gemma O'Rourke said a steady stream of participants contributed to the artwork throughout the session.

Participants learned about red ochre, or *ballawinne*, which has a spiritual and symbolic place in Tasmanian Aboriginal culture.

"We talked about *ballawinne* (red ochre) and other ochres that are the blood of Country," explained Gemma. "It has the resonating energy of Mother Earth."

"Palawa people used it to enhance their connection to Country and their intonement with the earth."

"So, we've used those colours (in the collaborative painting)."

Participants added their own symbols to the painting. "We looked at rock markings," explained Gemma.

"People added a symbol that was heart-felt for each

person."

Participants included Britney, age 11, from Ltyentye Apurte (Santa Teresa) in the Northern Territory.

Ltyentye Apurte is an Eastern Arrernte community of around 479 people, located 85km south east of Alice Springs.

Britney had travelled to Tasmania to visit family in Kingborough.

Taroona High School, Year 8 student Isabella, heard about the event on social media and came directly from school to help put the final touches on the artwork on Wednesday afternoon.

Mount Nelson Primary School, Grade 5 student Nicholas painted a bee flying to pollen on the artwork.

The communal art piece is to be displayed at the Kingborough Community Hub.

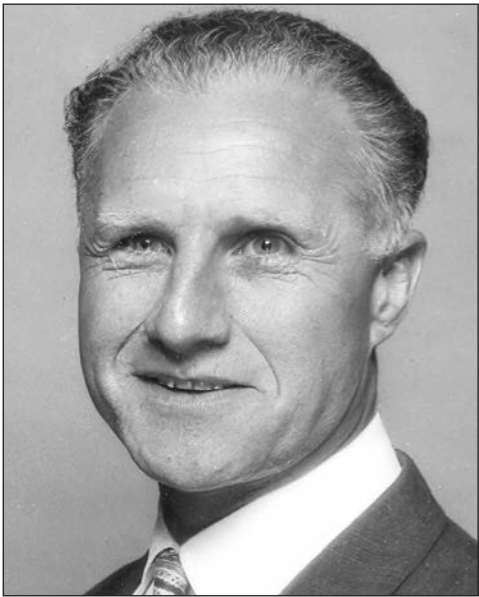

The original uniform was green and gold but when the school moved campuses, the colours changed to navy blue, white, and teal.
At the old site, the staff, students, and parents & friends association proudly opened an Aboriginal garden.
Kingston High School moved campus to Kingston View Drive in 2011, and everyone is pleased that the garden has remained a prominent piece on the grounds.
I had a chat with one of the lovely staff members at Kingston High School who is organizing the celebratory events this year, Ms Geason.
"2022 is a year to celebrate our 50-year anniversary and plans are underway to have various activities that involve the present student population," Ms Geason said.
"Late in Term 4 we are planning a celebratory evening for past students, staff, principals, and people who have contributed to the school's story."
The entire student body gathered on the netball courts to arrange themselves in the shape of '50' so we could take a photo.
There are also plans for there to be narratives printed in the *Kingborough Chronicle* throughout the rest of the year.
Our principal Dr Robinson has expressed that she is most "proud of us having built a full team of staff who not only believe that every student is capable of learning to

high levels but works tirelessly to hold that line".

Celebrating 50 years of Kingston High School

As part of the Kingston High School (KHS) 50th anniversary celebrations, former staff and students are sharing their stories of the high school's history.

Graham and Maria McGowen

Graham and Maria McGowen have had close links with KHS since its opening in 1972.

Graham, a first year out science and maths teacher, was appointed to KHS as one of the twelve founding members of staff.

Maria taught at other schools before resigning to raise their family but was invited back to teaching in 1988, by then principal Dennis Meahan.

Maria became a much-valued relief teacher at the school until her retirement in 2006.

Graham clearly remembers that first year at KHS when the founding Principal, Syd Eldridge welcomed 168 Year 7 students to the school.

At that time, the school consisted of just the gymnasium, two adjacent rooms, that were to become music rooms, and the courtyard.

The gym was divided into different sections, with each subject area being allocated a space of its own.

As the school's science teacher, Graham remembers having to make do with little equipment, apart from ten hand lenses, and he had to borrow basic equipment from neighbouring schools.

Teaching at a new school required innovation, and, for the first term at least, he spent most of the time walking his classes to and from Kingston Beach for ecology lessons.

Graham remembers the staff meetings, that were held every day after school that year, as the staff negotiated

their way through the teaching program while other buildings were constructed around them.

Each term saw a new building opened for teaching, and so the new high school, with its innovative, but controversial 'open plan', gradually took shape.

Although Graham was a newly trained teacher, he had not been prepared to teach in the new setting, and like others, spent much of the time adapting to the flexible teaching spaces, loose-leaf folders and individual teaching programs that were used by the school.

Syd Eldridge, a distinguished educator and an excellent teacher, led his new team of teachers in an adventurous, innovative direction that saw Kingston High School become one of the leading schools in Tasmania.

Graham also recalls the outstanding contribution by the assistant principal (and later principal) Dennis Meahan.

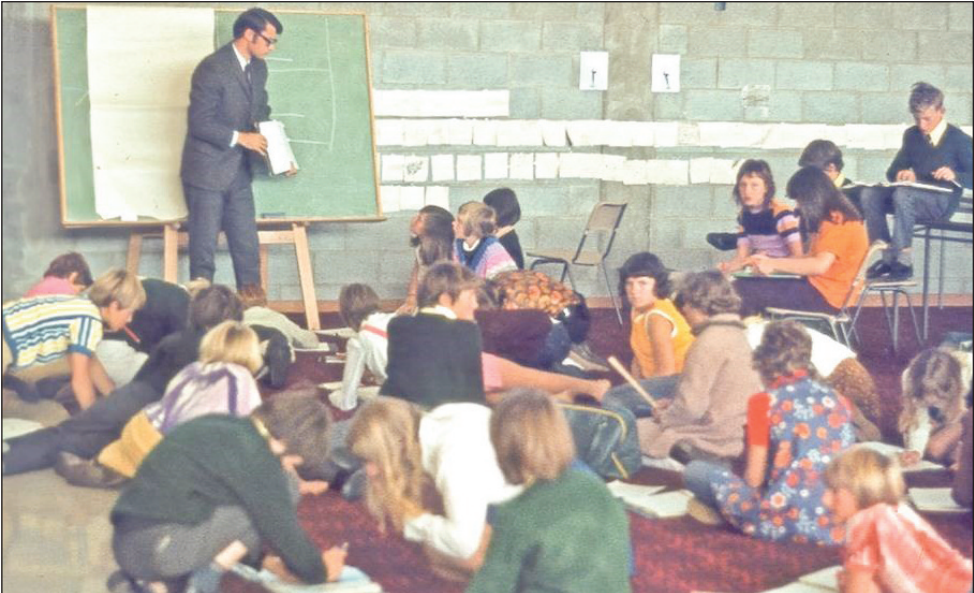
Between 1973 and 1994, Dennis Meahan helped establish the school and assisted thousands of students to become the best students they could be.

Dennis knew every student by name, and his unwavering support of staff was clearly remembered by Graham.

Graham left KHS in 1995, but still speaks affectionally of many of his staff colleagues in that first year, including Ted Olubus, Gary Jones, Pat Howard, Julie Gardam, Heather Felton, and Anne Boucher.

Graham took over Anne Boucher's physical education classes when she left in 1972.

Both Graham and Maria recall their time at Kingston High with warm memories, saying they were 'lucky' to have been part of a school community for so many years where they always felt supported.



Channel Men's Shed members resumed their monthly barbeque on Thursday, June 30.

Channel Men's Shed's president Peter Norris said the shed plays an important role in assisting with men's health and wellbeing.

In a statement marking Men's Health Week, held from June 13 to 19, Wendy Kennedy, Executive Officer with the Tasmanian Men's Shed Association, noted "The

health of men and boys is important, not only to them of course, but also to the whole community".

"So many health issues affecting men could be prevented by them having regular check-ups.

"Men don't miss getting their car serviced, but it's a completely different story when it comes to their own check-ups.

"In addition, services often fail to successfully engage

men, yet men account for 75 per cent or more of the suicide rate.

"We can see that prevention services reach women, so some of the focus is on advocating how to connect with men," noted Ms Kennedy.

"An example we have is our Dr Shed series, where we provide regular reminders.

"Just like a mechanic reminding you to get your car serviced although far more important.

"Last year in collaboration with the Australian Men's Health Forum, Mens Resources Tasmania produced a report that shows the funding gap for men's health.

"According to Men's Resources Tasmania's analysis of the 2020-2021 Tasmanian budget, the State Government allocated \$6 million a year to programs supporting women's health and wellbeing.

"In contrast, approximately \$665,000 was allocated to specific programs targeted at men's health and wellbeing, through Men's Sheds and accommodation for homeless men.

"In May 2021, the Federal Government allocated \$3.4 billion to its women's budget, which included \$535.8 million to support work on the National Women's Health Strategy.

"There was no men's budget and no funding allocated to support the National Men's Health Strategy.

"Many traditional community meeting places no longer exist and that's why safe and welcoming environments like a Men's Shed are so popular and are playing such a huge role in Tasmanian Communities right around the state, particularly in remote areas.

"It's as simple as dropping in for a cuppa and a chat with the chance you might make something, pick up a new skill and there's every chance you will make a mate."

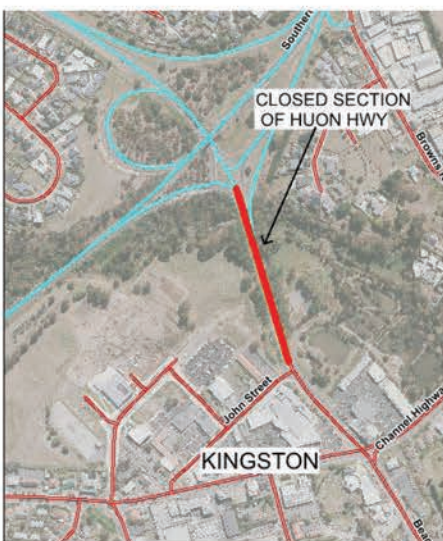
COUNCIL MESSAGES

Closure of Huon Highway

Council will be closing off Huon Highway from the traffic lights at the intersection of Channel Highway and Huon Highway near the Kingston Hotel to the Kingston Bypass.

This closure will happen whilst work is conducted on building a pedestrian underpass under Huon Highway.

This section of the road will be closed for up to 4 weeks from Saturday 9 July until the 9 August 2022.



Kingston Beach North Water

As a result of the Derwent Estuary Program's (DEP) long-term water quality ratings, Kingston Beach North had been classified as 'poor'.

The poor rating has come from 5 results out of 88 tests over the 5 years.

The rating applies only to the northern end of Kingston Beach, more commonly known to locals as Dog Beach, where Browns River flows out.

The 'poor' long-term grading means that swimming is not advised at this section of the beach.

While Council cannot yet point to the exact cause of the results recorded at Kingston Beach North, this site is subject to flows from Browns River.

Weekly water testing is continuing over the winter months, including at the Browns River catchment with Council already taking steps to intensively test and investigate catchments to find any sources of contamination.

Council's website will be updated regularly with weekly results and any relevant new information. (Link on KC homepage)
