Simon says bye as head coach

Kingborough Lions United Football Club (KLUFC) recently announced Head Coach of the Women's High-Performance Program and WSL Simon Edwards has stepped down.

Simon kickstarted the High-Performance Program 12 vears ago and helped the club's number of female players swell to forty percent of the club's playing members

Weighing in on emergency levy

The State Government has released a draft Tasmania Fire and Emergency Services (TFES) Bill, introducing changes to the fire and emergency services levy.

The TFES Bill proposes to abolish the insurance fire levy. Rather than sourcing State Emergency Service (SES) funding from insurance customers, the Bill offers a property-based levy instead.

This will be calculated using a property's Assessed Annual Value (AAV) multiplied by the relevant land classification rate and will continue to be collected via council rates.

"I am extremely concerned about the financial impact the new fire and emergency service levy will have on the residents and businesses of Franklin," said Kingborough Deputy Mayor Clare Glade-Wright.

"The implication is that properties with large valuations will cop an excessive rise, in some cases over 1000 per cent increase.

Minister for Police, Fire and Emergency Management Felix Ellis said current arrangements fail to provide the funding fire and emergency services need. "We are going to fix this to support our fire and emergency

services," Minister Ellis said.

The Voice to Parliament Referendum took place on Saturday, October 14. The Voice Referendum was defeated with a majority No vote. Over 7000 voting centres were opened across Australia, including one at the Kingborough Community Hub. Dee Beriya supported the No vote and Jill Hickie supported the Yes vote. The Voice proposed to establish a federal advisory body of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people to advise Parliament on Indigenous views. Prepolling was also available for those who needed to vote early. 4.5 million early votes were cast out of approximately 17.5 million eligible Australian voters. More on page 2.

Antarctic Division budget cut

The Senate is currently investigating the impacts of a \$25 million budget cut to the Australian Antarctic Division (AAD).

A recent hearing in October discussed the ramifications of this proposed budget cut, including the possible termination of at least 56 existing projects.

Senator Peter Wish-Wilson asked "What is the decisionmaking process within the AAD around, for example, this summer, what projects would proceed or what projects would be considered critical, like the ice core project or the Denman Glacier terrestrial work?"

"Do operations have the final say or significant input into what's actually facilitated?"

Senior Researcher at AAD Professor Dana Bergstrom said 'There's no clear understanding of the 'critical' category". "We've had multiple project assessment schemes.

"The current one was opened only to AAD and Government organisations.

'The projects were ranked in terms of priority: high, medium and nothing below that, I don't think. "It's mainly the executive group that makes that

decision about what things can go ahead." Deputy Secretary of AAD Sean Sullivan revealed the department had overspent \$42 million last financial year.

Mr Sullivan said this overspend occurred because the AAD had to employ a second ship while they were waiting for the new icebreaker, the RSV Nuyina.

Mr Sullivan said the \$25 million reduction was not a cut. "It wasn't trimming the budget, it was operating within the budget we'd been allocated," Mr Sullivan said.

The Senate inquiry will hand down its report by November 30.

Deputy Mayor discusses new levy

"This Bill essentially shifts the cost burden to business, commercial, and industrial landowners," Kingborough Deputy Mayor Clare Glade-Wright said.

"For example, a business which has a capital value of \$20 million and an estimated yearly rental value of (AAV) \$1.321 million, the current fire levy is about \$2575.

"Under the proposed levy at 2.4 per cent of AAV (option one) this property would have to pay \$31,720. "That is a sharp increase of \$29,145.

"And under option two (2.6 per cent) it would be even higher. "It would be far more appropriate for the State Government to fund their decision to abolish the fire levies on insurance premiums on a recurrent basis and increase their own investment in Tasmanian Fire and Emergency Services.'

Minister for Police, Fire and Emergency Management Felix Ellis said "Our Government will abolish the business insurance levy, reform the property-based levy, and continue the motor-vehicle levy".

"We will also increase the concession rate from 20 to 30 per cent and in doing so we will abolish an entire levv on Tasmanians

"We will consult on two options regarding the reformed property-based levy, including one that provides special consideration for rural communities.

"Both provide a growth model for our Tasmanian Fire and Emergency Service and the funding will be ring-fenced for our TFES to exclusively support them in the work they do and the services they provide.'

The Aussie bird count is on during National Bird Week, at 8.30am. October 16 to 22, and your observations can make a difference to bird conservation in Kingborough. There are bird-counting walks supported by Kingborough Council for those who want to learn how to survey bird

numbers. Meet behind the Community Hub (Goshawk Lane) at 7.30am, October 18 to join Scott and BJ from Council while they survey birds along Whitewater Creek track. Andrew from Birdlife Tasmania and BJ from Council will survey in the Algona Road reserve on Friday, October 20

Meet them at the Tetratheca Road entrance to join the walk.

Bring binoculars along if you have them.

This simple and fun activity supports understanding of the birds using your area. Each survey takes 20 minutes, and you can do as

many surveys as you like during the week. Visit aussiebirdcount.org.au/ for more information.

Dru Point footpath upgrade

Construction will commence on a shared footpath from the main gate of Dru Point playground to the kiosk this week.

This development is aimed at improving accessibility and safety for all users.

The 2.1-metre-wide concrete path will start at the entrance, continuing to the kiosk, and will provide better pedestrian access to the park for mobility and pram users

Kingborough Council plans to add a gravel footpath on both sides of the road from the kiosk to the dog park.

Dru Point is one of the most popular parks in the area, and it has undergone several updates to enhance its facilities.

In June the playground was upgraded with a new double flying fox, netting hammock swing, and orbit rope climbing frame.

The old equipment was replaced and the new double flying fox and rope climbing structure will be more appealing to older children using the park.

The construction of the footpath is expected to take around 10 weeks, depending on the weather.

World Homeless Day

October 10 marked World Homeless Day and Minister for Housing and Construction Nic Street stressed the importance of action on this issue.

"Every Tasmanian deserves a roof over their head," Minister Street said.

"We are investing over \$38 million annually on specialist homelessness services that provide our most vulnerable with a place to stay while acting as a touchpoint for wrap around services. "There are currently 19 homeless shelters and three safe spaces operating around the state, supporting Tasmanians each and every day.

"Whilst homelessness is something that impacts people from all walks of life, we are focusing intently on those groups considered most at risk."

The Government has also invested \$16 million in the Housing Connect model which will improve access to housing assistance for those Tasmanians finding themselves at risk of homelessness. "Tackling homelessness requires a multi-faceted approach and every Tasmanian facing homelessness has different needs and desires," Minister Street said.

"Through our long-term housing plan, we are working to ensure that every Tasmanian has safe, fit-for-purpose and affordable accommodation.

"We are also progressing our long-term housing plan to boost supply across Tasmania with 10,000 more social and affordable homes by 2032."

Child and family learning centres aim to improve the health, well-being, education, and care of Tasmania's very young children by supporting parents and enhancing the accessibility of services in the local community. More posties, more electric

License rules are being changed so anyone with a car licence can use the electric delivery vehicles (eDVs) used by Australia Post delivery drivers without the need for a motorcycle licence.

"We have listened to advice that these electric vehicles are safer and far simpler vehicles to ride than a motorcycle, are lighter, less powerful and more balanced," said Minister for Infrastructure and Transport Michael Ferguson.

"In the current tight labour market, the current restrictions limit the pool of workers that Australia Post can draw on.

"Now anyone with a provisional, full car, heavy vehicle or a motorcycle licence will now be able to drive these three-wheelers."

There are already 90 eDVs on Tasmanian roads and footpaths with approximately 50 per cent of delivery rounds undertaken by eDVs, which cut emissions and noise.



Protecting local parrots

Sightings have been made of a significant group of Swift Parrots in Kingborough.

The birds are returning from Victoria and following the flowering blue gums to Birchs Bay and south for breeding season.

The biggest threat facing the Swift Parrot is habitat loss. Old growth trees are often felled because the birds are not present at the time, but this is usually because that particular tree isn't in flower.

When the birds return to the area to nest at a time when the tree would typically be flowering, they arrive to find that their nesting site has gone along with their food supply.

Even the smallest hollow takes 140 years to form so replanting does not solve the immediate problem. The latest research indicates that there may be as

few as 750 individuals left in the wild. Recently, two Swift Parrots were rescued after being

injured. One sadly died but a female survived and was cared

for by Bonorong Wildlife Hospital before being released back into the wild.

For a species on the brink, every individual is precious. The survival of this female is one small step towards safeguarding the Swift Parrot and a testament to the importance of everyone helping where they can. Bonorong encourages anyone who finds an injured

Swift Parrot to help if it is possible and safe to do so. Bonorong Wildlife Hospital and Sanctuary advises the community that keeping cats indoors, providing a water source for birds in the warmer months and writing to your local member of parliament about your concerns are simple steps anyone can take to support native wildlife.

Because of their speed, window strikes are also a significant danger to Swift Parrots. Hitting a window at high speed can kill a bird or injure them and render them vulnerable to predators

like domestic cats. You can help to prevent these by using mitigation

methods like screens and sticky dots on highly reflective windows and glazed doors. What to do if you find an

injured or orphaned animal

The Centrelink age pension, making sense of it all

Centrelink can be confusing at the best of times. When terms like asset test, income test and deeming rates are thrown around it can add another layer of confusion, particularly when the tests and rates are forever changing.

Here we cut through the jargon to make some sense of it all

Apart from being the right age, your eligibility for the age pension is determined by the value of your assets (the asset test) and your income (the income test). The test that delivers the lower amount of age pension

is the test applied to you.

Asset test

This test assesses the value of the assets you and/or your partner own.

Common assets assessed include but are not limited to superannuation, real estate (excluding your family home), household contents, cash, shares, cars, and caravans. A common guestion is 'How much money can I have

in my bank before it affects my pension?' Your bank account balance counts towards your asset

test Centrelink assesses the money in your bank the same

way they assess your other assets. To receive the full age pension your assets must be

below \$301,750 if you are a single homeowner or under \$451,500 for a couple who own their home. If the value of your assets exceeds these thresholds,

you may still be eligible to receive a part age pension. If your assets are above the full age pension thresholds, the amount you receive will reduce by \$3 per fortnight per \$1000 of assets.

The greater the value of your assets, the less age pension you receive until it completely cuts out when your assets exceed \$667,500 for a single homeowner or \$909,500 for a couple who own their home.

For example, if the value of your superannuation fund falls, you might be eligible to receive a higher age pension.

This test assesses the income you and/or your partner earn.

Sources of income commonly assessed include but are not limited to employment income, rental income and deemed income from your financial assets.

To receive the full age pension, your fortnightly income

must be below \$204 a fortnight if you are a single or below \$360 a fortnight if you are a couple.

Like the asset test, if your income exceeds these thresholds then you may still be eligible to receive a part age pension.

If your income is above the full age pension thresholds, the amount you receive will reduce by 50 cents for every \$1 you earn per fortnight until it completely cuts out when your fortnightly income exceeds \$2397.40 for a single or \$3666.80 for a couple.

Deeming rates

Money in your bank and other assets such as term deposits, shares and your super are all classed as financial assets.

These financial assets are considered by Centrelink to earn you a certain amount of income using deeming rates. For example, if you have \$50,000 in a term deposit

earning you 4 per cent interest, Centrelink deems this money to earn a certain amount by applying their deeming rates, not the rate of your term deposit.

The deemed income from your financial assets is then applied to the income test

The deeming rate for singles is 0.25 per cent for the first \$60,400 of your financial assets and then 2.25 per cent on any amount above that.

For couples, a rate of 0.25 per cent is applied to the first \$100,200 and then 2.25 per cent is applied to any amount above that.

For example, if a single person has \$80,000 in a bank account and \$100,000 in super, these financial assets would be deemed to earn you \$2842 per annum by Centrelink.

This deemed income would then be applied to your income test.

Over time the value of your assets and income can change

It is important to update Centrelink on any changes to ensure you are receiving the appropriate rate of age pension.



Woodbridge team puts one foot forward

The Woodbridge Walks team is participating in One Foot Forward, an annual event held in October to raise awareness and funds for the Black Dog Institute.

The institute provides mental health treatment, education, and digital services to those in need. One in five Australians experiences a mental illness in any given year.

Approximately 60 per cent of these individuals will not seek help.

Team member Trina Blazely said that last year she participated in One Foot Forward for the first time, raising over \$2000 and walking over 300 kilometres.

"Staying healthy and active is incredibly important for my mental health and well-being," she said. "Developing a keen interest in photography has

added another element to my walking adventures and now it is a part of my everyday life." The Woodbridge Walks team has shown that

small steps can lead to significant strides in raising awareness and funds for mental health issues.

Deer farming regulations

New nature conservation regulations came into effect July 1, 2022.

Game Services Tasmania (GST) is currently inspecting all deer farms to determine whether they meet the requirements of the new regulations.

The regulations include new arrangements for deer farmers, including a deer farm licence system that aims to improve the responsible management of farmed deer and minimise the risk of farmed deer straying into areas where wild deer are not wanted.

Anyone keeping any deer, even if only one, must now have a licence.

GST wants to hear from all deer farmers to work with them to become compliant with the new regulations.

Wildlife management officers will work with deer farmers to understand and implement the new regulations within a reasonable period.

Dogs on Blackmans Bay Beach

Five tips to boost mental health Day, Beyond Blue shared system, low-intensity options are a critical piece of the

On World Mental Health Day, Beyond Blue shared mental health coaching tips to help people navigate everyday life stresses.

NewAccess Mental Health Coach Gemma Danahay supports people using a low-intensity CBT (cognitive behaviour therapy) coaching program, developed by Beyond Blue.

"More and more people are coming to me due to financial stress, as cost of living pressures escalate," Ms Danahay, who works with Lives Lived Well in Queensland said.

"The other main issues are relationship problems, work stresses, and grief and loss and sudden life changes. "I have found many people are looking for more than

just someone to talk to; they want to walk away with practical suggestions. "In mental health coaching, people receive proactive

skills and tools to work on the problems affecting their mental health."

Five practical coaching tips to help relieve stresses that can build up:

Deal with problems one at a time - break down problems into bite-size pieces

 Notice common thinking traps - all-or-nothing thinking, self-blame, repetitive thinking

Have realistic goals - make it achievable, it doesn't have to be perfect

 Balance is key - schedule pleasurable activities as well as work/family commitments

• Healthy habits - keep both body and mind healthy "Part of coaching is also around relapse prevention, so any dips in mood are an opportunity to explore early warning signs and what helps the person feel better so that they know what to do with any future drops on the roller coaster of life," Ms Danahay said.

Beyond Blue's lead clinician Dr Grant Blashki says there are multiple benefits to using low-intensity CBT and problem-solving to support our mental health.

"These techniques are based on evidence and are shown to improve clinical outcomes for common mental health conditions like depression and anxiety," Dr Blashki said.

"People who are using the skills are often able to reduce their negative thinking patterns, the severity of their symptoms, and find that they develop new coping skills that they can apply to other problems in their lives.


"A structured approach helps people to stay focused on their goals and people often come away feeling quite empowered that they have some new strategies to manage common stresses in life."






